Special Thanks to 2013-14 Washington State Composition Competition Judges

State Composition Competition judges perform a great service to students who enter the competition. They evaluate each composition that is entered and provide a detailed review of each student's work. There are no recordings of the scores. All scores are sent to the judges electronically. Students who enter receive their evaluations and an assessment of their work by a professional composer, which really is the heart of the competition.

All of our judges did an outstanding job. I would like to point out that this year we had one judge who for personal reasons could not complete work on the scores.

We had to find a replacement judge who, within the last four days of the deadline for sending the results to the Division level, would be able to complete the work. Judge Robert Lundquist graciously agreed to do the job during his busy schedule as a teacher and performer. He completed all 13 entries in four days! On behalf of the WSMTA and MTNA, thank you, Robert, for your extraordinary work and thanks to all the judges who participated.

Our judges this year were all from the State of Washington: Robert Lundquist, Pianist and Teacher, Bellingham; Jonathan Middleton, Professor, Dept. of Music, Eastern Washington University, Cheney; Scott Blasco, School of Music, Washington State University, Pullman.

Musicianship Exams for Strings! Pilot Program by Jane Melin

I am pleased to announce that I have completed an edition of the WSMTA Musicianship Exams for strings in the following areas:

Technique (Scales and Arpeggios): Levels 1-10 for violin, viola, cello, bass. **Sightreading:** Violin only, Levels 1-10. **Theory:** Modified from the Keyboard theory tests, treble clef (violin) only, Levels 1-8 (Levels 9 and 10 should take the Keyboard exam). **Listening:** Same as the Keyboard listening tests but with some questions omitted.

These Exams will be available as a pilot program at the KMTA Music Carnival. WSMTA is reviewing all the materials but will not be adopting them for statewide use in time for this year's Musicianship Exams. We have the opportunity at KMTA to use the materials, see how they work in actual application and help make revisions before they are released to a wider audience. (Continued in March issue)

STUDENT STUDY GRANT PROGRAM

Call for Student Study Grant Applications

Established ten years ago with a bequest from the Lois Whitner estate, the **WSMTA Student Study Grant** program will be accepting requests for applications for the 2013-2014 year. The purpose of the program is to provide financial assistance for continued private study to music students who demonstrate financial need and who show serious commitment to music study. The following guidelines apply:

- 1. The grant is open to music students currently in **grades 8 11** (note change) who have studied a minimum of 4 years and whose teachers are members (of at least 12 months standing) of WSMTA.
- 2. The applicant will be considered on a basis of financial need and commitment to music study.
- 3. The applicant must have participated in WSMTA sponsored adjudications.
- 4. Grants up to \$1,000 may be awarded. The applicant must explain specifically and in detail how the funds will be used. The grant will be for a period of not more than one year. Students may reapply in subsequent years by submitting another full application to the committee for consideration.
- 5. The grant may be used to offset the cost of music lessons, theory, or composition classes, or tuition for music camps.
- 6. The grant will be sent directly to the teacher or camp/program director.

Is an Adjudication a Destination?

What is the best compliment you like to hear someone say about you? How you look? What kind of a teacher you are? Maybe what kind of a person you are? Compliment you on your students' quality of playing and preparation?

If you ask me, I like all of those compliments! But are they the goal or just a "cherry on top" of our everyday work with students? Why do we do what we do?

As the season of adjudications and competitions quickly approaches, I find that I have to remind myself and my students more and more: we are on this journey together and the adjudication performance is not an end or a destination. It is just a moment in time to reflect on the past travel and to see the future itinerary more clearly. The "deadline" to get ready for a performance sounds like what it is: a "dead" line of something coming to inevitable ending. That is not how I want my students to feel about their performance preparation. The final polish and performance practice are steps to their growth as artists, their imagination is coming to life, and their goal to tell a story through music is becoming a pas-

Every year I have the privilege to adjudicate in three or four WSMTA chapters all over our state. Quite exhausted and often losing my voice at the end of an adjudicating day, I often feel inspired and energized by communicating with students and teachers. I feel honored to be invited to join them on their musical and often personal journey even if it is for just 12 minutes. One of the most important questions I ask myself when adjudicating is "How do I want this student to be changed after our session together has ended?", "What is one most important

point I want this student to remember and do?"

A teacher's journey alone can be enjoyable but often it might become confusing and discouraging. An adjudicator is your partner on the journey of music making and helping to raise a student to the new heights. Yes, "it takes a village to raise a child". In our profession, it takes more than just our own efforts to raise a student.

The winning competition performance can easily become a distraction to students and parents. Is that the goal of all this hard work? Or is a competition performance just a step to the next challenge? Is it a step and a pause before turning the new page in their musical journey and adventure? I explain to my students that the completion of working on their pieces is at the same time an opening of a new door to start the next adventure.

The WSMTA adjudication program is unique in its magnitude and quality of organization. Dorie Guidon, our WSMTA adjudication Chair, and Janice Smith, past Adjudication Chair and current President Elect work tirelessly to ensure the program runs smoothly and in the best way possible to help teachers and students to succeed. Your feedback is very helpful to both adjudicators and adjudications organizers.

Are you ready for your teaching journey and adventure this year? It may take you somewhere unexpected and new. You may even hear an entirely new compliment! Just ask an adjudicator!

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will help you understand what is happening in the music--it won't just be a big blur.

- 9. And once you can listen more carefully you will probably decide that what you are hearing isn't as good as you thought! A teacher will help you understand and maintain high standards and the sooner you get better, the sooner you will have fun.
- 10. A good teacher will help you when you get discouraged and give you concrete ways to get over the hump. A teacher will keep you interested and practicing.
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- 14. A good teacher will give you ideas to solve your problems if you want to quit.
- 15. A teacher will help you learn and understand the skills that will contribute to having a happy and successful life--and that should be music to your ears!

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
