President's Corner



Recently, a former student of mine sent me a New York Times article which discussed the link between music education and academic success. In this article, anecdotal examples included Condoleezza Rice. who trained to be a

concert pianist, and former Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan, who is also a professional clarinet and saxophone player. It seems that the more serious the music training, the bigger the success in other fields. And top level professionals in all fields draw a connection between their music study and their professional achievements. Just a few of the qualities they have that can be attributed to studying music are the ability to think creatively, work well with others (musical collaborations), and the development of acute listening skills.

This really isn't news to any of us. We have long known that what happens in our studios with students week after week after year after year, can affect our students' chances for success in life in measurable ways. And what about the immeasurable ways that music can add to our students' lives? Years ago I received a postcard from a former student who was taking college classes in Europe. wrote to tell me she had seen a concert by the Labeque sisters. She wanted to know: "had I ever heard of them? These two ladies could really play well! It was so exciting!" I wanted to ask her the question, "Do you know that you and I are now in the same club?"

The NYT article is indeed exciting, but what is also exciting to me is that I have a student out there who was captivated enough by the article to send it to me. Isn't it wonderful that we all have sent human beings out from our studios who are now recipients of good music, and the ideas and emotions that only music can express? And isn't it wonderful that their ability to receive and recognize these musical gifts helps make them humans of the highest order?

Out and about.... I recently visited the Puyallup Valley Chapter. They describe themselves as "a pro-student chapter where everyone wins". This chapter organizes fun and creative winter recitals, and they love their Teacher's Roundtable forum, where everyone comes with questions, answers, and teaching tips to share. I also traveled to Portland, OR for our NW Division meetings and Division level MT-NA Performance Competitions. Thanks again to Jani Peterson, NCTM, NW Division Director-Elect and Mary Kaye Owen, NCTM for their excellent organization of this event! Lastly, Seattle was the site for our annual winter Board of Directors meeting. It is such a treat to hear what our seven Districts are doing, and hear reports from many committee chairs as they carry out their service to WSMTA! We continue to be an organization with a mission to advance the educational goals of our teachers and students. Our Board was happy to send travel money to students competing in Portland OR. and we also will help those students competing in the MTNA National competition in Chicago in March. The Board also granted two "Small Chapter Grants": congratulations to Clarkston-Lewiston Chapter and to Walla Walla Chapter. These grants will help them to fund their educational workshops.

January was an exciting month for the conference planning committee. The budget was finalized and approved by the WSMTA Board. Due to the generosity of our host institution, EWU, our conference fee is going to be significantly less than it has been in recent years, at a very reasonable \$135. This fee will not only include tickets to a solo piano concert by our guest artist, Theresa Bogard, and all other performances, events, and sessions, but also a special Luau during the Wednesday lunch hour. There will be optional addons - the opening banquet on Sunday evening, and box lunches for those involved in noontime planning sessions and meetings as well as for those who want to stick close to the Music Building in case of inclement weather. All meals served will include a vegetarian option. On the registration form, you will also see a check-off box for dorm rooms. This check off is to indicate your interest in obtaining one. Be advised that these rooms are extremely limited. There are just 25 available, so they will be distributed first-come, firstserved - a great incentive for early registration for the conference. We are very pleased to announce that Teresa Bogard has agreed to give her very acclaimed session on technique, entitled "Technical Principles/Trouble-shooting the Problems Right Away". This session will take place on Thursday. **WSMTA** members who have seen this session given in other locations around the country have raved about it. By all accounts, Dr. Bogard has an amazing eye and ear and can spot minute problems in alignment or misuse of hand, arm or body which, when corrected, can lead very quickly to technical improvement and better performance. Dr. Bogard will also be conducting two master classes on Wednesday. Teachers who have students wishing to be considered for participation in the two Wednesday master classes should forward the names, ages, years of study, and repertory of their students to the Conference Chairperson, Barbara Heckenlively. These should be sent to her email address. heckpiano@vahoo.com. Both students and teachers are welcome to participate in the technique troubleshooting session on Thursday. Dr. Bogard would like to have 4 or 5 volunteers for the beginning of this session. If it goes as it has in other locations, very quickly many of the remaining audience members will be clamoring for an opportunity to go up to the piano on stage to get some wonderful technical advice.

Incidentals: There will be parking passes available for purchase. There are also plentiful meters around the Music Building, and free parking in the adjacent residential neighborhood. (Within 1-2

Although the proposed Conference Schedule is still subject to change, here is the general scope of daily activities:

Sun., June 22: social hour, banquet, registration and Washington State Winners Recital.

Mon., June 23: opening ceremony, honors recitals 1 and 2, sessions on Smetana, Beethoven, honoring the body, the ABC's of teaching, demystifying performance anxiety, steam-punk piano, a practical approach to jazz improvisation, among others, and "Starry Nights", an evening performance by faculty and advanced students from EWU and the Spokane area.

Tue., June 24: "free" day, including some sessions for string players and vocalists, a handbell, performance practice tips for classic ragtime, a lecture-demonstration of piano music by women composers for 4, 6, and 8 hands, sessions on learning through our ears, honors recitals 3 and 4, and evening concert performance by our guest presenter, Theresa Bogard.

Wed., June 25: two masterclasses with Theresa Bogard, the final honors recital, the luau lunch, sessions on the technical development of the beginner, what lies beneath – an exploration of the bass line, teaching a comprehensive curriculum, copyright considerations for music teachers, some repeats of popular sessions, and an evening concert featuring the winners of the Young Composer project and the state commissioned composer's new work.

Thur., June 26: Theresa Bogard on "Technique, troubleshooting the problems", and closing ceremonies.

Interspersed with all of these events will be showcases, and opportunities to browse for music and/or other exhibits, as well as strolls through campus or exploring nearby Spokane.

ERTIFICATION CORNER

The moss is growing again. I can see its yellowish mossy green color amongst the darker green of the (sparse) grass. As I look out the back patio door in the misting rain, it's obvious that it loves this type of weather. It does add a hope of freshness for the springtime yet to come. However, once the nicer weather gets here and I get out to walk on the "grass" I will say once again that the yard is 40 years old and needs some rejuvenating. That however takes work...and am I up to it? Is it worth it?

As with all yard projects, as I go through the hard, dirty, and hot work I'll decide over and over that it is frustrating, not worth it, going too slow, taking too long, and I probably shouldn't have started. However, if I can keep the end result in mind I will keep plodding along and before you know it I could have more grass blades than moss. By this time next year the grass could be "younger" and a rich shade of green.

Younger next year is a theme in our house right now—and not just for the lawn. Both my husband and I are approaching another "*0" year, so we have been reading the books <u>Younger Next Year</u>. (There's one written for men and one for women.)

I wouldn't mind feeling younger next year...however, the premise of the book is you must exercise six days a week, 45 minutes a day, enough to get your heart rate to 65% of it's maximum. Based on my experience of my regular exercise schedule this past month of every other day workouts (that's only three or four days a week mind you), my premise is if you exercise for the six days in a row, and it doesn't kill you, you can't help but feel younger! The author gives lots of examples about "old" people who were sedentary, out of shape, and heading down the path to the wheelchair, but then committed to the six days a week exercise job and are now doing some amazing things. Since I would rather remain fit and not age (gracefully or otherwise) into my "olden years" exercise is becoming part of our "work routine."

How about your teaching life...is there yellow-green moss growing, or signs of

declining muscle strength and coordination in your studio? Maybe working through the national certification process is just what you need to have a "younger next year" studio. It will take work, time, energy, and commitment, just as any major goal. Are you up to it? Is it worth it? One year from now will you have a vibrant green growing lawn or a stronger more flexible physique—teaching wise?

In the words of one candidate who just submitted portfolios after a year of (hard) work... "I am very happy with my portfolios, learned so much, and would do it all over again..." This candidate is a "year younger" in the teaching mindset, having worked through a pretty comprehensive presentation of her teaching getting rid of some moss and flab in the process and growing some new green grass and healthy muscle!

So, how about you? Are you up for it? Check out the MTNA website (<u>www.mtna certification.org</u>) for information on the certification process. By this time next year you too could have a moss free younger-next-year teaching life!

Psssst...don't forget WSMTA has four certification grants of \$100 each to help with the cost of applying for certification. Awesome fertilizer or energy drink for helping with the rejuvenation project!!!

lar comments or decisions of the judges, the appropriate procedure is to approach first the chair of the event, followed by the Education Board Chair and/or the WSMTA President. Your commitment to this procedure demonstrates professionalism at its highest and ensures that the competitions will be a pleasurable and positive experience for everyone involved in the competitions—students, colleagues, and adjudicators. Our adjudicators are TREASURES, and deserve our respect.

Many years ago I attended a Suzuki workshop led by the talented and caring flutist Kenichi Ueda. Even as he corrected and offered suggestions to the students you could tell how much he cared about them as people. At the end of each coaching he and the student would bow to each

bother. It was a gracious way to end the lesson

"Hmmm.." I thought. "How can I replicate this in my own flute studio?"

Of course I love people bowing to me (just kidding!) but that seems over the top. Then I hit upon the idea of simply asking each student to say:

"Thank you for the lesson" at the end of each lesson. As students leave their first lesson I simply say, "And all of my students say thank you for the lesson." For the first month or so the moms may have to elbow them to remind them but after a few lessons students volunteer the greeting and after a few months of learning and having fun each student sincerely says:

Thank you for the lesson!" and I say "You're welcome" or "Thank you for being such a great student!" or "Thank you for a good lesson!"

Students are also required to come in the door with a smile and say, "Hi Bonnie, how are you?" If they don't, I gently remind them. "Hi Parker how are you?" If Parker doesn't respond with the greeting to me I pointedly say, "And how are you Bonnie?" They soon get the hint.

Why are these greetings important? Because they set an atmosphere of respect in the studio. Manners, pride, and respect are inseparable. I want my studio to be a haven in a sometimes crass world. I also want my students to know that they are lucky to have lessons here and that just bringing the check isn't enough. Polite greetings are an easy way for students and teachers to show each other they value and respect the special relationship found in music lessons.




