#### **History of the Clarion**

Although our association was established in 1915, it wasn't until 1949 that WSMTA created its own monthly state newsletter. Sixty-five years ago the new publication of our CLARION was born! The first issue was called the:

# EVERGREEN STATE CLARION OFFICIAL ORGAN OF THE WASHINGTON STATE MUSIC TEACHERS ASSOCIATION NOVEMBER 1949 VOLUME | NUMBER |

Generally there were 9 issues per year, from October to July. It began on a 12" x 9" piece of paper that was folded in half to make 4 small pages. There were letters to the editor and articles from the editor; articles from the state president and past president; local chapter news; MTNA National news; Northwest Division news; conference reports; articles concerning music education in the State of Washington; articles concerning our state programs; and later, a column called "Let's Get Acquainted" where different officers in the state were introduced. In the early years, musical terms for titles of articles were often used such as CON BRIO, TUTTI MA NON TROPPO, SEGUE CON BRIO, DA CAPO, RIPIENO and VOLANTE. The president's article was often referred to as "Headquarter Highlights". Today there are titles such as "President's Corner", "Coming Events", "Education", and "Enrichment". (Continued on Page 3)

Our Scholarship Fund assists competition winners with grants to help with travel expenses as they progress to the division and national levels. The fund also provides the prize money for the student winners of the annual Outstanding Artist Competition. We have partnered with MusicLink, a national program to bring music study opportunities to low income students. Our student study grant program provides financial assistance to needy students who have demonstrated a long-term commitment to music study. WSMTA is grateful to our many donors whose generous help over the years has enabled us to continue these programs.

Recently, WSMTA has established an **Emergency Fund**, the proceeds of which are designed to help students, families, and teachers who are beset with unexpected financial calamities due to natural disasters, loss of employment, or sudden illness.

Our **Teacher Enrichment Fund** has been established to offer grants toward certification, small chapter workshops, district conferences, conference waivers, dues waivers and generally provide assistance in many ways for our members.

Washington State Music Teachers Association is grateful to our many donors whose generous help has enabled us to continue and expand upon these programs!

And...we want to continue to grow our investments to one million dollars! This goal will help sustain our organization for another one hundred years, and the earnings can be used to help the next few generations of teachers and students. We encourage individual studios and chapters to help us come up with ideas that will raise funds!

In the second year of the CLARION's publication, the heading became the artful design that you see at the top of this issue. It was very fitting as it showed the mountains, trees and water which pointed to our evergreen state. In March 1952, the paper changed from an off-white color to a light green-colored paper. In one issue more space was needed and a one time printing was done using 18' x 9" paper size with a tri-fold. By the start of the fifth volume in the fall of 1953, a larger format with the paper size 15" x 10 1/2" was used to enable more articles to be printed. In February of 1959, the artwork was discontinued and by early 1960 the publication was returned back to the off-white color paper but this time with green type. The title also changed and now would simply become known as, *THE CLARION – Official Bulletin of the Washington State Music Teachers Association*.

For the first 13 years the CLARION had been in a 2 column format. In December 1962, that format was changed to the usual 3 columns and by the October 1968 issue the paper size becomes the same that we are using today. Finally in 1984 the green colored ink changed to our now oh so lovely black!

WSMTA has had 13 CLARION Editors. Each had their own style and creativity, and gave of their time and talent to bring the WMSTA members the news prevalent to their times. With members being spread all over the state, the monthly newsletters are so vital to our association for communicating all the exciting news and opportunities for every member. Before the age of computers, being an editor had to be very challenging! Even with today's technology, the editors still have a huge job.

The following is an accounting (to the best of my ability) of all the WSMTA CLARION editors. A great deal of gratitude goes out to all these editors for keeping us informed and for their skills in giving an historical account of our association.


## MTNA Performance Competition November 7-9, 2014 Central Washington University

### **Student Study Grants**

A little history.... In June of 2001 WSMTA received a generous bequest from the estate of Lois Whitner, a former WSMTA president and 52 year MTNA member, whose hope was that the earnings from her gift could be used to promote the love of music study by young people. A committee developed our student study grant program that was approved by our Board of Directors in 2003.

The monies are conservatively invested and the interest earned is used to fund grants every year to qualified students who demonstrate financial need and a serious commitment to music study. Recognizing that the costs of music study continue to rise, our Board of Directors recently voted to raise the maximum grant to \$1,500. All Student study grants are used to offset the cost of music lessons, theory or composition classes, or tuition for music camps. Since its inception in 2003 WSMTA 's Study Grant program has awarded 81 grants totaling \$30,350. This is just one of the ways we honor our commitment to our mission of fostering music education.

A "call for applications" that explains all requirements and guidelines will appear in our February Clarion. The application, due May 1<sup>st</sup>, can be downloaded from our web site. Click on "forms."

#### You Teach More than Music

We are all here to help each other grow...... it goes both ways.

Adjudications can inspire the desire to become better teachers...if we have the proper attitude!

## Prepare your students (and their parents) for the adjudication

- What should they think about between pieces?
- What will it be like if this is their first time?
- How should they dress, walk, perform, present themselves?
   Dress sloppy = play sloppy. This is not an exam, it's a performance! You

- can help your students to develop a sense of pride and importance.
- Do your students understand why they are doing adjudications???

The reason should be so they can become better performers and you can become a better teacher. Adjudicators know if you are only there to fulfill the competition requirement by participating in adjudications. How sad ③. You and your students could be missing out on a valuable educational experience. The purpose of adjudications IS NOT a run-through for competition. They may play for only 50% of their total adjudicating time and the adjudicator is allowed to stop them to leave time for their evaluation.

- Do they know it's not ok to be late? Late students will not be adjudicated. Remember, every student has contracted with the adjudicator for a time slot. You cannot take someone else's time! This also pertains to returning from lunch with the adjudicator. If you can't have them back in time, don't do it!
- Do students have a good attitude going in? That depends on what sort of attitude <u>you</u> present!!
- Be sure to select appropriate repertoire for participating students. Classical repertoire is required, not popular, i.e.: Let it Go....ugh!

## Prepare yourself as a teacher for adjudications

- KNOW the rules....yes, there are rules!! Read or re-read the booklet.
- Do you present yourself well and look your best?
- Are you late? Are your forms sloppy?
   Or are you well prepared and professional?
- Do you have a positive attitude?
- Do you buy adequate time? Teachers that really want to learn will be sure to buy adequate time for their students to not only perform, but to learn in this educational experience.
- Do you treat the adjudicator with professional respect?
- It is NOT OK to personally contact an adjudicator with a complaint. Please contact Dorie at <u>dorieg33@comcast</u> <u>.net</u> to file a grievance form.

Remember that the suggestions of adjudicators are for you to use, consider for improvement or not!! You are not there as a teacher to argue with the adju-

dicator's viewpoint. It will be different than yours....hopefully.

Please fill out the evaluation form if you enter 5 or more keyboard students or 3 or more voice students. The adjudicators really care about evaluations. They like having ideas to "tweak" their skill. Suggestions are very helpful if they are polite and would sincerely help them to become better adjudicators. Direct criticism is not helpful to anyone. If you check off all 10's, please elaborate on what you really liked!

Wouldn't it be nice if you and your students sent the adjudicator a thank you note! Do you know that they treasure these? ©

## WSMTA Adjudication Subsidy Grants

Do you teach students who are financially strapped? They would like to do WSMTA's adjudications, but they simply don't have the money to pay the fee? WSMTA can help!

To be as fair as possible, teachers are asked to limit their applications to students with real financial need. There is a limit of two students per teacher. WSMTA adjudication subsidy grants will be awarded on a first-come first-served basis. Time is of the essence: when all the money is allocated, the grants will cease, so apply on behalf of your needy students today!

## **Enrichment**



Like each of you, I am always looking for a new method for beginning students. Recently, I have been seeing and reading about a new method about which teachers are very enthusiastic-- *Piano Safari*, developed by Katherine Fisher and Julie Knerr. Fisher and Knerr are graduates of University of Oklahoma, studying under Jane McGrath and Barbara Fast. You can read more about their extensive back-

grounds and find out more about the series at *pianosafari2.weebly.com*.

To quote the authors, "We designed *Piano Safari* to progress slowly in terms of reading and quickly in terms of playing ...because children can play more complicated pieces than they can read, we include Rote Pieces, Folk Songs, and Challenge Pieces that progress at a faster pace." At present there are two levels available, each level including a Repertoire Book, Sight Reading and Rhythm Cards, a Listening CD, plus Technical Exercises and Rote Pieces with CD.

The idea of a *Piano Safari* comes from the Technical Exercises which have names such as "Lion Paw, Zechariah Zebra, Tall Giraffe, Tree Frog, Kangaroo, Soaring Bird, and Monkey Swinging in a Tree." These exercises are taught by rote. Repeated eighth notes are taught from the beginning--for example, Zechariah Zebra is 4 eighth notes followed by 2 quarter notes. Their reasoning is that students like fast rhythms and it broadens rhythmic possibilities. Consecutive

eighth notes are delayed until the student develops more coordination. Many teachers have indicated that they use this book with other methods as well.

This method uses an intervallic approach, beginning with seconds, thirds, and fifths, then adding the fourths which are hardest to read. Repertoire 1 focuses on reading one hand at a time while grand staff reading begins in Repertoire 2. The authors suggest that Repertoire Level 1 will take about one year to complete, 6 sections totaling 119 pages. They also use syllabic counting, using Ta's in Level 1 and introduce metric counting in Level 2.

The authors provide extensive information, teacher guides, blogs, videos, mini essays, etc on their website, as well as an online store. They make suggestions as to supplementary materials as well. Prices range from Repertoire Book 1 at \$16.95 to curriculum packs at \$35.50 and up. The Technical Exercises & Rote Pieces Book and CD is \$15.95.

Another new method is **Piano Pronto**, developed by Jennifer Eklund, and described as piano lesson books for all ages and levels. Eklund has been teaching since the age of fourteen, and is a graduate of California State University, Long Beach. Again more about her and this method can be found at pianopronto.com. The philosophy of this method is that students learn notation from day one. She finds off the staff reading confusing and places letter names inside the note heads at the beginning level. She states, "Reading music is about looking at notation and instantly making a connection with staff location and a location on the keyboard. With the letter names inside the noteheads students will start to infuse the unique locations of notes on the staff with their locations on the keyboard." Note to Teachers suggests that "any beginner with no prior experience who is under the age of 10 should start their study with "Keyboard Kickoff" in which the pacing is slower than the Prelude books and allows ample time to establish a firm foundation of note-reading skills." Her series includes 9 method books, plus play along tracks, and an extensive collection of supplementary materials from Greatest Hits to Beethoven. Her website also has Sheet Music Downloads at \$1.49

per title. Books are priced from \$10.00. Again, like the other method, the website includes extensive information about the books, teacher resources, questions and answers, reviews, and a store.

Both of these series are available via the websites, at Amazon, and are published independently, indicative of the new marketing of the 21st century.


