in the beginning! History of W.S.M.T.A. Part III.

(Continued from the 2015 February CLARION)

History notes obtained from the Evergreen State Clarion, November 1950 – June 1951 Additional information was gleaned from articles written in later CLARIONs

I left you last month with the inception of our Association and those amazing

people who took the lead. Now to continue with our story......

During the immediately ensuing month, following the organization of the State Association in Tacoma on June 19, 1915, County Presidents were appointed in 17 counties throughout the State - Chelan, Columbia, Cowlitz, Jefferson, King, Kitsap, Kittitas, Lewis, Pierce, Skagit, Snohomish, Spokane, Thurston, Walla Walla, Whatcom, Whitman, and Yakima.

These appointees were automatically designated to serve as Vice-Presi-dents of the State Association. Other county officers could be elected as needs arose. Meetings of the County Branches were to be held quarterly at a time and place designated by their individual Presidents. Standardization or certification of private teachers was the first major project to be undertaken (more on this project in a future article, but remember - this was 1915!)

The third annual convention program (1918) lists 20 County Presidents - Clarke, Ferry, Grays Harbor and Stevens Counties having been added, with Kitsap no longer appearing in the roster. In 1919 apparently the county plan of organization was abandoned in favor of three state districts - east, central and west. The names of three District Vice-Presidents first appear in the 1919 roster of state officers, and the State Constitution was amended in 1920 to legalize those offices.

At the 1932 Convention the status of a Chapter was defined in the By-Laws, namely that "any local association of five or more music teachers may become a chapter of W.S.M.T.A. by collecting State Association dues of \$1.50 for each member". Furthermore, "...each Chapter may make its own By-Laws, subject to the Constitution of the State Association."

Washington took the lead in organizing a Western Division of MTNA in 1949. The Charter members were Arizona, Montana, Oregon and Washington, with others following later. At WSMTA's 1950 State Convention, it would be decided whether or not to become affiliated with the regional organization as a part of a bigger and re-activated National Association.

In October 1950, Washington officially voted to adopt individual membership affiliation with MTNA. This meant that WSMTA had to guarantee that 50% of the active membership would so affiliate, at an annual cost of \$2.00 over and above the local and state dues. It was now no longer possible for anyone within the State of Washington to join MTNA without first becoming a member of the Local and State Associations. To corrspond with National, our fiscal year was changed to September 1- August 31. All local Chapters were urged immediately to make similar constitutional changes.

By May of 1951, a letter was received from the State Treasurer that over half of WSMTA members were paid-up MTNA members. Thus fulfilling the pledge of 50%. Though an exact date could not be found, it appeared that in 1953 WSMTA became 100% affiliated with MTNA.

For 45 years, WSMTA maintained having 3 districts with those District Vice-Presidents part of the Executive Board. At the June 1965 State Convention it was voted to increase the number of districts to 4. These new districts were called Northwestern, Southwestern, Northeastern and Southeastern with specific landmarks delineating their borders.

This concludes the "First 50 Years of WSMTA". Hopefully these two articles have given you a glimpse of how our Association was founded and how the groundwork was laid for who we are today. Stay tuned, as next time I'll share some insight into our state programs. You may be surprised!

Enrichment



All the music publishers are releasing new materials in preparation for the annual MTNA conference in March, being held in Las Vegas. Here are a few new releases to tempt you in hopes you will be able to attend the conference!

From the Willis Music Spectacular Solos are several new releases by Carolyn C. Setliff, a very creative composer for elementary students: "Sand Castles" and "The Mysterious Forest." I loved the sound of "Sand Castles," a mid-elementary level piece that begins with descending thirds outlining a d minor triad. The four measure phrase outline is then repeated with melodic fill ins. Words are added to help with the rhythm but the melody flows very naturally. The second section moves to a Bb chord and then an F chord with a little chromaticism in the Left Hand. An echo effect allows the student to leap octaves and would be a nice place for some pedal. "The Mysterious Forest" is a hands together piece in 3/4 meter and A minor. The A section has an eight measure repeated period followed by a change to C major in the B part. The piece ends with a hand over hand ascending E broken chord then descending A minor chord to the lowest A on the piano.

Wendy Stevens has a new early intermediate release, "Whirling Shadows," for that student that always wants to play fast pieces! She opens the piece with an attention grabbing melodic idea: G and D in the LH bass followed by G D C# D C# A in the RH below middle C. And then we are off in a whirlwind! A transition syncopated figure moves the piece to the B part where the RH takes it over. There are lots of octave changes, ending on a wonderful ninth sound.

A new duet by Wendy Stevens that would work well for siblings in the studio is "The Knight's Quest" for early elementary level in the Primo. The Secondo is a little harder. Using a limited number of notes, she creates an exciting duet with a strong rhythm feel using simple rhythms such as quarter, quarter, half note, and two eighths, quarter, quarter. Frequently the two parts play the same rhythm.

Hal Leonard Publishing has just released the winning composition for the 2014 Carol Klose Composition Competition: "Mambo" by Changhee Lee for Late Intermediate level duet. The Primo has an octave melody throughout while the secondo provides the rhythm section and chord color. There is a wonderful half step chord change from F to Gb major for the secondo. This is a challenging piece, especially for the secondo!

Another release by Hal Leonard for Disney fans is "Contemporary Disney Duets for Intermediate to Advanced students, including, of course, "Let It Go" from FROZEN, as well as "Touch the Sky" from BRAVE, "I See the Light" from TANGLED, and "He's a Pirate" from PIRATES OF THE CARRIBEAN.

IMTF Corner

>What's on your students' iPod?

As my student finished playing her well-prepared piece for me I thought, "Something's missing, but what?" I asked her, "So Jennifer, what kind of music do you listen to on your iPod or computer?" "Pop," she responded. "How much classical music do you hear?" "Well, sometimes we put on KING FM in the car and I listen to the piece I'm working on." Jennifer was rarely listening to classical music and that was the missing ingredient in her playing. She was playing what was on the page and following my instructions but she was merely a parrot, not a musician. She couldn't express herself because music was like a math problem to her, not an emotion.

Why should your students listen to classical music?

> They will become better musicians

I tried to learn Japanese on my own several years ago. I went once a week to a Japanese teacher and practiced what she had told me. I memorized the phrases from the book and tried to remember the accent but I didn't get far with only one hour a week of exposure to Japanese.

We are asked an impossible task to teach our students the "accents," "the common phrases," and the traditions of classical music in one hour a week. Just as I would have become a better Japanese speaker if I'd had dinner seven nights a week with a Japanese family, your students will learn the traditions of classical music by soaking it in during their daily life. And of course this advice isn't limited to classical music but to any music you study and enjoy.

> They will fall in love with music

Studies have shown that the music we love throughout our lives is the music we hear in our teen years. The more classical music you hear the more you begin to have your favorites and get hooked on music.

> They will become lifelong listeners.

So let's be frank. Very few of our students become music majors, fewer still become professional musicians or teachers, and a great many of them rarely touch their instrument after they leave

high school. Our mission statement as teachers should be to give our students the knowledge and experience to create a lifelong love of music. Long past the time when they play their last soccer game, when their lives are crowded with jobs and children and distractions, music will be there for them as a joy and a comfort, as a hobby and an intellectual delight, and as something that brings people together. This is the joy we as teachers cherish for ourselves and that we can offer our students.

Start their listening habits now

Listening assignments in my studio have included:

- ***Composer of the month.** Write a short bio and discuss (I gush) one piece at each lesson.
- •Artist of the month. Assign a specific famous performer of their instrument for them to listen to on YouTube and write observations. "What's she doing that makes her sound so good?" This is a fun way to teach the repertoire too.
- **Listen to past YouTube recordings of students**. This is very motivating as they get tips on how to play their current piece and visualize themselves performing these works.
- **Listener's choice:** on YouTube or KING FM and write a one sentence observation.

My goal is more than to have my students learn music history or repertoire. My goal is to get them *in the habit of listening* on the radio, YouTube, Pandora, Spotify, and any other invention that makes listening easy anywhere and anytime so music becomes a part of their lives forever.




