Challenge-of-the-Month:
Make an "Environmental Improvement"

s a private teacher, I enjoy receiving my own lessons and have joined a coached nutrition and fitness

program. The nutrition program recently posted a lesson about how our environment shapes our eating. The important part of the lesson is how modifications to the environment impacts and changes habits, increasing success. This video was posted as part of the lesson:

Most people were taking the escalator until they converted the stairs to a piano keyboard that actually plays notes! Piano steps changed the environment resulting with 66% more people taking the stairs.

Clearly, what's around us changes our decisions. What changes to your studio or chapter environment might increase student success, teacher satisfaction, or chapter health? Environmental factors in the studio might include a new metronome or metronome app; new or different lighting; displaying student photos or achievements. At the WSMTA Leadership Seminar in September, attendees participated in a session titled: "How's Your Chapter DNA (Durable,

Noteworthy & Active)?" Teachers were asked to create a list of habits, procedures and methods for chapters that will:

- 1. Sustain **D**urability;
- 2. Support and increase Noteworthiness; and
- 3. Maintain and encourage **A**ctivity.

The information gathered will be compiled and structured to create a full member survey seeking <u>your opinion</u> as to what it means to have a healthy chapter (watch for that to come soon!).

CHALLENGE-OF-THE-MONTH: Make an "Environmental Improvement" which will increase your studio and chapter DNA.

Here are some ideas to spur your own creativity:

Studio **D**urability

Durable: Maintain an ability to exist or work for a long time, even if the situation changes.

Jonna's music studio has been declining for several years, so she has decided to make a couple of changes to encourage referrals and inquiries.



- 1. Jonna has asked for parents to participate in lessons once per month, joining the student for one piece to become the percussion section. In a piano studio, this may be playing a bass tone on the beat; for a wind, string or voice studio, the parent uses rhythm sticks or simply claps. Parents and students have great fun, sharing their experience with other parents, who may then call and inquire about lessons!
- 2. Jonna adds a digital picture frame in the studio that scrolls through studio snapshots of lessons, recitals and group classes. Students and parents alike enjoy the photos and Jonna offers a free thumb drive with the photos to share at home and on social media.

Noteworthy: Worthy of or attracting attention especially because of some special excellence.



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New Music Review: *How Do We Choose?*

hen it comes to supplementary books or teaching solos, how do we choose from among the thousands of such items available? Festival Lists, Contest Lists, Music Publishers, and Composer Collections are a great resource.

Since 1898, the National Federation of Music Clubs (NFMC) has promoted arts in the United States through education and musical events. The NFMC bulletin provides a carefully graded list of music appropriate for recitals and contests. This bulletin is readily available on most major music publishers' websites by a simple search for "NFMC." This search should provide a list of that publisher's selections in the bulletin.

FJH has included many of their NFMC selections in the series "FJH Federation Favorites" books 1-4 (FJH \$6.50-\$6.95). Each book includes 13-14 bestselling solos from the NFMC bulletin by a variety of FJH composers. Since each selection is also available as a single teaching solo from FJH, these books could be used as studio

copies. Books 3 and 4 have just recently been released and include a wide variety of styles and challenges. From Carol Matz's "Quiet Waters" with its soothing jazz harmonies in a gently rocking 34 meter to Melody Bober's "Raging Storm" with its driving triplet accompaniment and hand over hand melody that gives the impression of being tossed about in a storm, these books are sure to capture your students' imagination.

"Favorite Festival Solos" books 1 and 2 (Hal Leonard \$7.99) are collections of NFMC selections by some of Willis' most popular composers, including

Glenda Austin, Randall Hartsell, the late William Gillock. These books have been newly engraved and include performance notes from each composer. The selections range from early elementary to early intermediate.

"Contest Winners" books 1-4 (Alfred \$7.99) compile carefully graded pieces from Alfred that are drawn from festival lists and contest lists, representing some of the most popular and effective solos by Alfred composers. Each book includes suggested practice and performance tips for each piece by teacher and editor,

Victoria McArthur.



If you prefer to focus on one composer, you might consider the "Favorite Solos Series" from Alfred Publishing. Alfred asked ten of their composers to choose their personal favorites from solos published throughout their career. For each composer, these favorites were compiled into a three book collection graded early elementary to late

intermediate. The most recently published is "Melody Bober's Favorite Solos" books 1-3 (Alfred \$7.99). Selections are, almost without exception, student pleasers. From the elementary pieces in book 1, many of which are perfect for a Halloween recital, to books 2 and 3, these pieces are sure to capture your students' imagination and invite expressive playing.

Independent Music Teachers Forum: Music & Sports — A Healthy Mix

all sports are in full swing – the pros, the college teams, as well as school-aged athletes from elementary through high school. Chances are you have students in your studio who participate in sports . For many, it is a year-round activity.

Having lived through my own children's participation in sports, I've observed a variety of coaching styles: some who ran their teams like a military boot camp, and others who employed an "it's only a game" attitude setting a low bar for success. The best coaches were able to balance high expectations with reality. They demanded commitment, energy, enthusiasm and hard work. They coached their athletes to be focused team players who strengthened their individual skills and supported others. Most importantly, they knew when a student was experiencing stress, anxiety or had to deal with a personal or school priority - in other words, they knew when to push and when to back off – on and off the field.

As an independent music instructor, I have tried to use many of these coaching techniques with my students. They are particularly useful after summer vacation when some students return out of shape – with rusty fingers; unfocused minds; eager but definitely not ready to perform in my annual Halloween Piano Recital. Here's where "Coach" (aka "Maestro") enters the picture. In the first lesson after a break (not just summer but at any time of year for any reason), the student and I – and their parents – discuss goals and a timeline for achieving them. Some goals are immediate – drills (exercises) to get

"unrusty;" some are longer-term like repertoire choices, theory and/or an extracurricular musical pursuit (listening, reading about a composer, exploring improvisation, to name a few). We list their goals, being as specific as possible, and set a realistic date to reach each goal.

In each lesson, we review their progress, reward their accomplishment, and if a goal is not met, we figure out why and how to get back on track. Like a sports coach, I require their commitment, energy and hard work but try to remain flexible especially if a student is struggling. The life lessons students can learn from the pursuit of music are just as important and long-lasting as those skills nurtured by a top-notch athletic coach – perhaps even more so. Musicians can continue to play, study, learn, listen and appreciate music for a lifetime, unlike athletes whose skills diminish as they age.

So, put on a "Coach's Hat" the next time you need to jump-start a student who has taken a break or has reached an impasse.

Emphasize the need to work hard, focus and drill (practice). Motivate them to reach their potential and do their best. Stress the skill of listening, not just to their own musical output but to their peers and professional players as well. Reward their achievements both big and small. Don't accept "I can't" as an answer. Know when to "fold 'em" and allow the student to take a short breather — with a solid foundation, they will most likely bounce back with enthusiasm and renewed commitment.

Music Technology News

erhaps you can relate to my tale. Each year when I re-launch my studio, I have lots of marvelous organizational and teaching ideas, but I drastically underestimate the time I need to fully implement all of them. No matter how early I start planning, the last few days before lessons begin are always a flurry of filing, organizing, emailing, and sorting. I find myself in a conundrum: wanting to adopt a new technology or system to help me be better organized, but short on the preparation time needed to research and learn a new system that would save me time in the long term. This year I'm "beta testing" a few new ideas and I'll share my experiences here and on the WSMTAHome Facebook page, but I won't ask you to only take my word for it: you'll find links to blogs and videos by other teachers as well, so I hope you will enjoy exploring with me!

For the Organizationally Overwhelmed

This year I'm using Evernote in a significant way in my studio. Evernote is an organizational software that allows you to collect "notes" (both those that you originate and also web clippings, photos, video and audio files, etc.). You can readily share notes between your mobile devices; notes online can be accessed from a computer.

My goal is to replace my handwritten Books Log, which was just a sheet of notebook paper that I write every music score, book, and CD I loan or sell to a student... except when I

forget, which is a problem. Simultaneously, I have a problem with my students not reading or "losing" their lesson assignments during the week, and then coming back the next week with a blank look and an excuse that goes something like, "oh, you didn't tell me to practice that." With Evernote, I can create a Lesson Assignment template, copy that into individual notebooks labeled with each student's name, then type the specific weekly assignments right onto my template for each student during the lesson. Then the magic happens: I can attach a recording of me demonstrating part of the piece, or a YouTube link for the student to listen to, AND I can label anything in the note with a Tag (so if I gave the student a book, I can tag it "Loaned" or "Music to Order").

At the end of the lesson, I email the note to the parent and student, and the original stays with me in the student's notebook for my reference (going paperless is fabulous)! Then later, I can search within Evernote for any tags marked "Music to Order" and there's my list—no more handwritten log sheets! If Evernote sounds like something you might be able to adapt into your studio life, check out Leila Viss's Music Teachers Helper blog review, or Natalie Weber's Music Matters blog review.
