2009-2010 Handbook Changes:

- 1. Junior Brass competition has been discontinued.
- 2. The piano concerto requirement

for the Senior and Young Artist levels has been discontinued.

- 3. The performance times have been modified to fit the performance requirements;
 - a. **Junior:** all students will have twenty (20) minutes of performance time.
 - b. Senior: State level twentyfive (25) minutes for brass, piano, piano duet, string, woodwind. Voice will have twenty (20) minutes.
 Division/national levels: thirty (30) minutes for brass, piano, piano duet, string, woodwind. Voice will have twenty (20) Minutes.
 - c. Young Artist: State level: thirty (30) minutes for all categories. Division/national levels: forty (40) minutes for brass, piano, string, woodwind. Voice will have thirty-five (35) minutes.
 - d. **Chamber Music:** State level: thirty (30) minutes. Division/national levels: forty (40) minutes.
- 4. Accompanist fees have also been adjusted:
 - Junior: \$80 for forty-five (45) minutes rehearsal and performance (no change). Senior Instrumental: \$150 for sixty (60) minutes rehearsal and performance. Senior Voice: \$90 for forty (40) minutes rehearsal and performance. Young Artist Instrumental:

Young Artist Instrumental: \$175 for sixty (60) minutes rehearsal and performance. **Young Artist Instrumental:** \$200 for ninety (90) minutes rehearsal and performance. **Young Artist Voice:** \$175 for sixty (60) minutes rehearsal and performance

Call for Student Study Grant Applications

Established four years ago with a bequest from the Lois Whitner estate, the WSMTA **Student Study Grant** program is now accepting requests for applications for the 2009-2010 year. The purpose of the program is to provide financial assistance for continued private study to music students who demonstrate financial need and who show serious commitment to music study. The following guidelines apply:

1. The grant is open to music students in grades 6 – 12 who have studied a minimum of 4 years and whose teachers are members (of at least 12 months standing) of WSMTA.

The applicant will be considered on a basis of financial need and commitment to music study.
 The applicant must have participated in WSMTA adjudications.

4. Grants up to \$1,000 may be awarded. The applicant must explain specifically and in detail how the funds will be used. The grant will be for a period of not more than one year and may be approved for additional years at the discretion of the Student Grant Committee. Students seeking grant renewal must submit another application to the committee for consideration. 5. The grant may be used to offset the cost of music lessons, theory, or composition classes, or tuition for music camps. 6. The grant will be sent directly to the teacher or camp/program director.

Dear Allegra

My goodness sakes alive, you certainly have a lot on your plate. You have a couple of options here.

You may apply for an extension of one year, and with your explanation it would most assuredly be granted. There is a \$100 fee for the additional year.

You also may want to consider waiting and starting the process all over when you have more time. I would suggest getting as much together as you can, and then start submitting a new application when you know you can finish up in the two year time period. Remember, timing is everything, and now is not always the right time for everyone.

Y'all can do it, when the timing is right!

ENRICHMENT



We all know it takes time to become a good pianist as well as time to become a good teacher. Not only time in the literal sense but also, T.I.M.E., which stands for Teaching, Inspiring, Motivating, Encouraging.

As teachers, we are always looking for ideas to help put more T.I.M.E. in our studios.

I am sure you are aware of the MTNA website that has some ideas from our colleagues, but have you visited that site yet? If not, go to the Home Page, click on Resources at the top, and then on Teaching Tips. There are quite a few categories of tips that are shared. If you have a specific question you can go to the discussion board to ask your question and receive some answers from other teachers.

There are probably lots of other sites I am unaware of so if you know any that are quite helpful, let us know. I would really like to be able to put in our IMTF column some of the T.I.M.E. ideas that the WA state teachers have. Would you please contribute either individually or as a chapter, some of the things that work for you? Some ideas may have been around for a long time, but still new to someone. None of us knows everything and you can never tell when something you share is just what someone else is looking for.

Our friend and colleague Dr. Peter Mack says he is always gathering these ideas and gives credit when he can remember where he got them. One of the times he gave a workshop he suggested we have a notebook on the piano to record "My Great Ideas".

I am one who has taught many years, but I am still collecting your great ideas! May I share one I picked up last fall at a workshop in Spokane at Music City. Quite a few teachers were in attendance and may have tried this idea. It was presented by Dr. Fred Kern and his materials came from the Container Store. We have a Dollar Tree, so I modified the idea with what I could find. This idea works great for visual/tactile learners but as I polled my students they tell me that it is helpful to each of them. I purchased ice cube trays which have 16 sections @4/\$1, a bag of red pompoms, \$1.

Turn the ice cube tray to a horizontal position. Place a pompom in each section as one note of the scale. The naturals will be in the lower row and the #'s or b's in the upper row, no matter whether they are black or white. The students name the notes as they place a pompom and again when all are in place. We also discuss how to best finger these notes for ease. It has eliminated the "play and correct" method that sometimes took place even after verbal review. The visual just seems to help.

I have also used it in teaching the five finger positions and having the students remove extra notes and leaving only 1,3,and 5 for the chord. Best of all using this is fast, easy, and inexpensive.

Going from 1 octave to 2 on the scales also seemed to cause fingering problems when teaching it verbally. By using two trays and overlapping the last two of tray one with the first two of tray two, it seems to have eliminated that problem of how to finger going in to the second octave.

Another thing that surprised me was how many unplanned things came up in the discussions such as; correct spelling since scales are diatonic; tonic will always be in the first cube; a new sharp always coming up in cube 7, etc. I would be willing to wager that you will find even more things where the students will respond with...oh, I get it now! I use blue pompoms to replace the red ones on the specific notes when we are doing minor scales and chords. Good luck as you try this tip that I have found very valuable!

<u>Reminder for WSMTA organists</u>: Please indicate "organ" as one of the instruments you teach when you renew your MTNA membership.

<u>For Pianists Who Wish to Learn</u> <u>Organ</u>: Every summer, the American Guild of Organists (AGO) sponsors week-long summer organ institutes called Pipe Organ Encounters (POE).

POÉ+ is for adults, ages 19 and older. Two tracks of instruction are offered: beginning and experienced. Beginning students are proficient pianists who will learn the basics of organ playing including technique, pedaling and registration. More experienced players will continue to expand their repertoire while gaining expertise in hymn playing, sight reading and transpos-All students will gain ition. greater confidence and competence in organ playing under the guidance of an outstanding faculty.

POE (for teens ages 13-19) introduces young people to the organ through instruction in organ playing (private and group instruction), repertoire, history, design, and construction. Basic keyboard proficiency is required, although previous organ study is not necessary. Local POE committees provide guidelines for the required level of keyboard proficiency.

POE Technical is designed for students (ages 16-23) who are interested in learning the art and craft of organ building. Previous organ study is not a requirement. For more information, contact the American Guild of Organists (212) 870-2310; email:
