President's Corner



SMTA chapters and teachers are among the most active, vibrant and energetic group of people I have ever worked with. The many events and programs which promote artistry, education and musical skills abound in every chapter I have visited over the last two years. I don't know if there is a "Top Ten List of Active

Music Associations," but if there were I would say we would rank right up there with the best.

Most times being in the top ten is a great accomplishment. WSMTA has made another top ten list, too, but regrettably it is **not** good news. As of March 1, 2017, WSMTA is in the top ten states who have <u>lost membership</u>. We are down by almost 7% over the same time the previous year. There are many reasons and rationales as to why non-profit associations such as WSMTA are struggling—most of you know the general trends. It is essential to move forward and tackle this problem.

To state the obvious, we need to:

- 1. Figure out what's going wrong.
- 2. Decide how to fix it.
- 3. Learn from our mistakes.

#1. Figure out what's going wrong: Membership Survey. You should have received in your email inbox a WSMTA Membership Survey. If you have nothere is a link.

PLEASE TAKE THE TIME TO FILL OUT THIS SURVEY: <u>WSMTA</u>
<u>Membership Survey</u>

I promise it will only take a few minutes, but the information you supply is critical to our ability to address our membership losses. If we can gather the appropriate data and information, we increase our ability to pinpoint specific issues and address them both in the short-term (the next year or two) AND the long-term (5-10 years).

- **#2.** Decide how to fix it. While we gather the survey data and assemble it, we won't sit idle. Most of you know the standard suggestions for membership recruitment and retention. WSMTA Membership Chair Yelena Balabanova and Arts Advocacy Chair Debra Florian have written several engaging articles in past *Clarion* issues. But here are two important areas chapter can apply to help "Fix It:"
 - Activate and expand your virtual presence. Let's face it—a majority
 of people have an intimate relationship with their smart phone, tablet,
 iPad and computers. Go to any restaurant, airport, or public venue and

you'll notice how many people are "connected." What if they saw a Facebook ad for your chapter workshop, or that you have studio openings? If they "Google" private music teachers—does your website show up?

- Consider a modern website with a LOGO.
 - ⇒ We remember pictures better than words. There are several very inexpensive internet resources which will create a modern logo for your chapter or studio.
- Create a Facebook (or other Social Media) Business Page.
 - ⇒ Advertise your events on Facebook: Here is link that explains how it works, and how much it costs. Facebook Advertising. It is DIRT CHEAP!
- Keep your content current. Update your information and photos weekly.

2. Have a membership <u>committee</u>.

- The job is too important for one person. WSMTA members love to collaborate!
- Have membership updates and issues addressed at board meeting and general member meetings EVERY TIME!
- **#3.** Learning from our mistakes. Let's face it—we all learn better from our mistakes than our successes. When I personally or professionally make an error in judgment, communication, spelling, performance, etc., I quickly evaluate what went wrong and take steps to improve. It doesn't mean I won't make those mistakes again—but I sure try harder!

THE MISTAKE WE MAKE WITH MEMBERSHIP: When we expect members to find value in our organization, on their own, without providing continuous value to them through diligent, regular and dynamic efforts to engage on both a professional AND personal level, our membership will decline.

The most important thing you can do to assist our membership numbers is the MAY CHALLENGE OF THE MONTH: **REVERSE THE FLOW**.

Historically, members engaged with us: It was a flow IN to our group. They came to us seeking education, community and engagement that was unavailable from other sources. There are now many, many resources, groups and communities competing for attention, time and money.

We now need to go into REVERSE:

 WSMTA need to engage with members and potential members, looking to THEIR NEEDS FIRST. We need to flow OUT—offering relevant information, education and interaction at all levels before we can expect current or new members to pay dues, volunteer and be active in the organization.

How can we do that?

- ♦ Learn everything you can about your members!
 - ⇒ Create a *Member Database* with as much professional and personal information as possible.
 - ⇒ Give every member—new and old—a membership questionnaire so you can learn about their professional and personal lives.
 - ⇒ Then engage with them <u>every month</u> through personal contact, cards and flowers (birthday, graduation, retirement, etc.), social events and invitations, referrals (personal and professional... maybe someone needs a dog groomer or dentist?).
 - ⇒ Create a new position in your chapter: Social Coordinator!

Through a process of personal interaction, engagement through technology and providing easy and fast access to education, information and collaboration we can REVERSE the trend and move to the <u>TOP TEN STATES INCREASING MEMBERSHIP!</u>

When we make people the most important asset in our organization, then members will stay, and new members will be excited to join!







WSMTA Commissioned Composer of the Year: Brent Edstrom

YOUNG COMPOSERS PROJECT & COMMISSIONED COMPOSER OF THE YEAR RECITAL

Friday, June 23, 2:30 P.M.



Brent Edstrom received a bachelor of music degree in classical piano performance from Washington State University and a master of music degree in jazz studies and contemporary

media from the Eastman School of Music. An active composer, Edstrom's compositions and arrangements have been performed by numerous symphonies including the Dallas Symphony, Kentucky Symphony, New Haven Symphony, Spokane Symphony, and Orchestra Seattle. His compositions include works for orchestra, chamber ensembles, and jazz ensemble, and he recently finished a song cycle based on the writings of Willa Cather that will premiere in Bordeaux, France this summer.

Edstrom has published extensively including over 100 note-for-note transcriptions of the music of Art Tatum, Bill Evans, Kenny Barron, Oscar Peterson and others as well as 48 volumes for Hal Leonard Corporation's Jazz Piano Series. Recent publications include Recording On a Budget and Arduino for Musicians: A Complete Guide to Arduino and Teensy Microcontrollers, distributed internationally by Oxford University Press, and Musicianship In the Digital Age, distributed by Thomson. Edstrom teaches composition, theory, and jazz studies at Whitworth University in Spokane.

Edstrom's commissioned work will premiere at the YCP & Commissioned Composer of the Year Recital on Friday, June 23 at the WSMTA Conference.

ADVANCED PIANO MASTER CLASS

Thursday, June 22, 3:45-5:15 P.M. Peter Mack

Pianist Peter Mack was born in Ireland, where he had his early training with Frank Heneghan at the Dublin College of Music. Subsequent study was at Trinity College, Dublin, and with Bela Siki at the University of Cincinnati College Conservatory of Music and at the University of Washington where he earned his doctorate in piano performance.



Mack has performed throughout the United States and Europe, as well as in Australia and the

former Soviet Union. He is the winner of the New Orleans, Young Keyboard Artists and Pacific International Piano Competitions. His prize in the Sherman-Clay competition included a Steinway grand piano. Mack is well known for his extensive repertoire, having performed twenty-five concertos with orchestras. He is equally in demand as a performer, clinician, convention artist, and teacher, and his pupils are frequent winners of local, national, and international competitions.



Adjudications Gets a Facelift!

fter another successful adjudication season (with many thanks to our state Adjudications chair, Dorie Guidon, and each chapter's adjudications chair!), many studios are operating with renewed enthusiasm and direction. The dedication of our teachers and students in their preparation - and of the adjudicators for giving their time and talent to inspire and share insights—makes adjudications one of the most important events of the year for many WSMTA members.

The Board of Directors, in an effort to impact even more students and teachers, accepted changes for the adjudications program recommended by the Education Board at their January board meetings. These changes are designed to simplify many aspects of the program and open eligibility to more students. Some highlights of the new program that will go into effect next year include:

- Only 4 levels for students to enter, based solely on the length of repertoire, not on repertoire difficulty.
 - ⇒ 10 minute adjudication for up to 4 minutes of music
 - ⇒ 15 minute adjudication for 4-7 minutes of music
 - ⇒ 20 minute adjudication for 7-10 minutes of music
 - ⇒ 30 minute adjudication for 10-15 minutes of music

- While students are expected to be well prepared for adjudications, memory will be optional—at the discretion of the studio teacher.
 - ⇒ Memorization of two pieces will still be required for students who enter each chapter's State Recital Competition.
 - ⇒ Those students who do prepare two memorized pieces will be recognized by WSMTA.

With the 10, 15, 20, and 30 minute increments, passing time between students will be eliminated, and between studios (where not combined with a break or lunch) passing time will be 5 minutes, which will ease time scheduling for everyone. Upper and lower division categories will be eliminated, and the determination of state recitalist numbers will be based on the total minutes of adjudications in each chapter.

With a new format brings new opportunities to encourage our students and teachers to take advantage of this reaffirming and inspiring program at the heart of WSMTA's educational mission. More details will be forthcoming in the next issue of the *Clarion* (and at the conference in June!), including a new name for the program—stay tuned!




Carissa Pitkin Jones, District VI Vice President Nominee

Music Review

Urtext: Staying True to a Composer's Intent

he term Urtext finds its roots in the German word "Ur" describing something old or original. An urtext edition is engraved from its primary source such as a composer's manuscript, a facsimile or a first printing. No alterations have been made to the music. Publishers strive to produce a musical score which closest reflects the composer's intentions. This is in contrast to "interpretive editions" which offer editor's opinions on how to perform the work. Urtext editions are often beautifully produced



with careful consideration of page turns, clear printing and paper quality. Publishers of Urtext editions include Bärenreiter, G. Henle and Wiener Verlag. The following are samplings from each. —*Mary Jackson, Music Review Chair*



J.S. Bach's Well-Tempered Clavier Vol.1 (BWV 846-869) and Vol.2 (BWV 870-893)


Published by Bärenreiter and edited by Bach expert Alfred Dürr, these urtext volumes are beautifully typeset and contain no fingerings or editorial markings of any sort.





W.A. Mozart's Sonata for Piano in A Major K. 331 (300i) with the Rondo "Alla Turca"

Published by Bärenreiter, this up-todate edition includes critical commentary by editor, Mario Aschauer. The section on performance practice includes valuable information on touch, articulation, pedaling and ornamentation. True to Bärenreiter's high standards, the pages are clean and legible and paper quality is good.



The Complete Chopin: A New Critical Edition

Published by C.F. Peters, this series includes Chopin's "Impromptus", "Ballades", "Waltzes" and "Preludes." Each book is edited by a distinguished C.F. Peters editorial team and includes an introduction examining the work's historical background, compositional features and practice issues. The editors used Chopin's autographs and retained Chopin's authentic fingering.

Easy Pieces with Practice Tips, Vols.1-6 (\$19.95 each)

From Wiener Urtext's "Primo Urtext" series, these books are designed to bridge the transition from piano method to repertoire, usually occurring around year two or three of piano study. Each book offers 25-40 easy piano pieces by three different composers (two familiar, one less so) plus helpful practice tips.



Ludwig van Beethoven's Piano Sonatas, Volumes 1 & 2 (\$49.95 each)

Published by G. Henle Verlag, these Urtext editions of Beethoven's 32 Sonatas, without fingering, are edited by Bertha Antonia Wallner and offer an alternative to Henle's fingered edition by Conrad Hansen.





Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's Piano Sonatas, Volumes 1 & 2 (\$30.95 each)

The Mozart Piano Sonatas were the first entry in the G. Henle catalog when it was founded in 1948. This two-volume set is the latest update by editor Ernst Herttrich. It remains true to Mozart's original score which had no fingering. Herttrich's preface and critical report provide detailed information on all the sources and textual issues.

Setting Up a Studio Lab

Wondering if a keyboard lab station is a good idea for your studio? Read this great article by Wendy Stevens at ComposeCreate.com. If you're still interested, Jennifer Foxx at http://musiceducatorresources.com/ has created an extremely helpful and FREE online course with the very catchy title "The Basics of Starting a Music Lab". This online video tutorial is broken into 7 relatively short modules that clearly describe the entire process, from outlining the benefits of a lab, to equipment lists, to scheduling and managing your studio.

The talented Michelle Sisler and Co. at Keys to Imagination have provided several resources that are simply fantastic for the teacher who is just starting to add a lab component to his/her studio services. Michelle Sisler and Michelle Gordon have

written a wonderful step-by-step PDF workbook "Studio Makeover Technology Edition" to help you plan your studio lab, from evaluating what subjects or areas you want the lab to address, to sample forms—like internet use forms, letters to parents, and more. They are currently in the process of revising the book so it will be available again after this summer.

Also offered on the site is the Double Click Curriculum, which matches apps, websites and

Using the iPad in Your Studio

Leila Viss has literally written the book on using the iPad in a myriad of ways in the music studio, from business tools to educational apps for students to hardware components (like how to hook the iPad up to a keyboard, how to use Square to accept credit card payments, recommendations for microphones and more). If you own an iPad or are considering using a tablet for even some of your studio elements, Leila's book, "The iPad Piano Studio" and industrious blog are invaluable resources.

The Biggest Lexicon for Apps

Music Apps for Musicians and Music Teachers: If you're not a piano teacher but are on the lookout for apps that will suit your existing needs, this book (and I recommend the e-book version, so you can tap on the hyperlinks that will

take you directly to the apps store or website) is for you. Elizabeth Axelrod has compiled an impressive annotated list of apps available for a variety of devices, and very helpfully organized them by chapter categories like Recording Music, Singing and Ear Training Apps, Preparing and Evaluating Performances, instrument families, and subject areas (like Theory and History). Even though this book is a couple of years old now and the shelf-life for many apps is quite brief, the sheer volume of information here is remarkable.

If you're not sure about purchasing such a large resource but still need some tips on what music apps might best suit your needs, here are my top three sites for apps reviews by music teachers:
