MARY KAYE OWEN joined MTNA in 1985, first as a member of Georgia Music Teachers Association, then transferring to Washington State Music Teachers Association in 1987. A colleague in Georgia advised her to join so that she could "get more students." The friend told Mary Kaye that all she needed to do was "pay the annual duesnothing else is expected." Mary Kaye glanced at the WSMTA newsletters she received while working in Renton from 9 to 5, six days a week at a heavy construction office in the late 1980s. She taught piano after work at students' homes for several years.

After marrying Dan (a Boeing computer programmer), Mary Kaye got out of the heavy construction industry and continued her education at the University of Washington, where, in 1992, she earned a Master of Arts Degree in Music Education. She already had a Bachelor of Sacred Music Degree from Multnomah University in Portland, Oregon. Her home studio in Renton began to grow, and she decided to visit the South King County Chapter of WSMTA. Other young teachers were in the group, and the long-time members and leaders were welcoming and encouraging. The chapter hired a nursery attendant during the monthly meetings to watch the young teachers' little ones, and in 1994, Mary Kaye began bringing baby Thommy along with her. That's also when she first volunteered to serve as a committee chair (Auditions). Volunteering to serve the chapter has been a commitment to Mary Kaye ever since.

Over the years at the chapter level, Mary Kaye has been Adjudications Chair, Yearbook Editor, Musicianship Examinations Chair, Treasurer, Vice President, and President. At the state level, Mary Kaye has been Secretary,

Vice-President, President-Elect, and President. She is currently the WSMTA MTNA Performance Competitions Senior Coordinator, NW Division MTNA Competitions Chair, South King County Chapter Co-President, SKCMTA Yearbook Editor, and Lake Washington Chapter Music Literacy Program Chair. In 2016, Mary Kaye was given the WSMTA Honorary Life Membership Award.

MTNA has provided a "lifestyle" for her and her family. She is a dues-paying member of MTNA, WSMTA, SKCMTA, and LWMTA, and she attests that 95% of her income is a result of that membership. Her Georgia friend was correct about one thing - Mary Kaye "got more students" from chapter referral lists. Two paying positions Mary Kaye currently holds came about because they were announced at a chapter meeting and in a

2018 Young Composers Project

SMTA is pleased to announce the 2018 Young Composers Project. This competition gives students the opportunity to submit their compositions for judging and comments by qualified adjudicators. These adjudicators are college professors and/or private teachers whose area of expertise is composition.

The project provides educational feedback, a goal-setting format, and a focus on music that students love—their own compositions. Adjudicators select a first, second and third place composition for each grade level giving written comments. Certificates are awarded to all participants, and a small monetary prize is awarded to each first place winner (see the rules and guidelines form for details). First place winners are invited to perform their compositions at the WSMTA Conference each summer.

Pipe Organ Encounters: Organ Camps for Youth & Adults



T

he dark days of winter are the perfect time to be dreaming of summer music camp. If you have a piano student (youth or adult) who is interested in learning about the organ, I highly recommend a 4-5 day music camp called a pipe organ encounter (POE). Sponsored by the American

Guild of Organists (AGO), a POE is for ages 13-18. A POE+ is for adults. Both the youth and the adult programs offer the opportunity for participants to have private organ lessons, visit and play different organs, learn about the history and construction of the organ, and interact with others who also have an interest in the organ. POEs take place in several locations throughout the country. Popular locations often fill quickly, so it is not too early for your students to look into the



The Spirit of an Independent Music Teacher: Past, Present, and Future



his is the time of year we tend to take stock of our lives. We review the past year, celebrate the present and plan for the future. Like Charles Dickens' Ebenezer Scrooge, we may encounter people and situations that force us to look inward and

make changes in our lives and behavior.

What a perfect time to apply the three "spirits" of past,

present and future to being an Independent Music Teacher. At the June conference IMT forums, we discussed many aspects of being an IMT. Two topics that came up most frequently were how to market ourselves (at any stage of our careers, not just starting out) and how to foster healthy competition within our studios.

This month, let's focus on **marketing**. Marketing involves projecting a persona or "brand," communicating what value you as a teacher bring to your students' musical development, and of course, demonstrating skills. Marketing tells a story—your story.

Let's compare the marketing tools of the past, present and future.

One of the best "old-fashioned" methods for finding new students was, and still is, "word of mouth." Developing good relationships with students and their parents inevitably led to

referrals. Displaying a yard sign (assuming compliance with town/city zoning laws), putting an ad in a local paper or posting a flyer with cut-off contact information sheets on a store bulletin board were also effective ways to build a roster. Networking with colleagues, performing and becoming involved in your local music scene were also good ways to attract students and teaching opportunities.

While the methods may change, many of these marketing tools remain effective ways to recruit students and build your studio.

Telling your story can now be done digitally—with images, words and sounds. Electronic bulletin boards, community blogs, and social media platforms provide connection to the marketplace. Below are several ideas that came out of our IMT Forum discussions in June:

• **Create a website.** Just about everyone in our discussion forum recommends having a website. Your website will tell your story – your teaching philosophy, methods, opportunities you offer students, testimonials from satisfied clients. It can reflect your personality, sense of humor and teaching experience. There are many options to create a website, from paid developers or do-it-yourself tools to free resources: Weebly, WIX, SquareSpace, to name a few.

• "Old-fashioned" tools like posting flyers or advertising can be done both digitally and in print. Neighborhood social media sites like Nextdoor.com can be very effective marketing tools, either alone or combined with print media.



- Networking. Getting together with colleagues, attending a workshop or conference, forming a group to discuss the challenges of teaching (including marketing your studio)
 —these are all opportunities to build your visibility as an Independent Music Teacher. WSMTA and your local chapter offer many opportunities to network and socialize!
- Make a connection with your local music store. Often, stores will offer lessons with instrument purchases or rentals—and if you are on their list, the store can be a great source of referrals.
- **Perform!** All agreed that one of the best marketing tools is doing what you love and "showing your stuff!" Many of us gained students because the person heard us play and loved what they heard.

Take this magical time to enjoy the holiday season, celebrate your accomplishments of the past year, and perhaps envision your "Future" as an Independent Music Teacher.




Music brings beauty and comfort into our busy, overbearing surroundings.

Certification Corner



I never forget the day I walked into my first Mountaineers class earlier this year. After a full afternoon of teaching piano lessons, I drove to downtown Everett and found a seat in the crowded classroom in the back of a climbing gym. People with excited

smiles filled the room and anticipated the start of the evening. In the front of the room there was table set with a collection of ice axes, crampons, and other sharp objects I didn't recognize. What am I doing here? I'll never be able to learn how to use all that gear, let alone be a strong climbing partner. These climbers have so much more experience than me. These were just a few of thoughts that entered my mind as my heart raced and the leader welcomed us to the first night of class.

Throughout the next six months I would endure and succeed in the rigorous Basic Climbing Class, learn how to use "all that gear," and become a strong climbing partner to those on my rope team. The class taught me how to work through anxiety both on and off the trail. The Everett Mountaineers sets a high standard of skills that are taught to all their climbers. Every single Basic Climbing student had perfect attendance, went on training hikes, practiced crevasse rescue techniques, took written and practical skill tests, studied Navigation, and learned Wilderness First Aid. I strongly valued these standards when climbing with people I had just met! I knew I could trust them.

Similarly, our national professional organization, MTNA, has worked hard to provide us with the best program to become certified. The five project certification process is clear-cut, easy to understand, and possible for every teacher to complete. It provides for us standards to meet, exceed, and to excel. Being certified adds an additional layer that speaks to your credibility as a teacher. If you've considered certification for awhile but haven't applied, now is the time.

Did you know WSMTA has grants available to cover half of the \$200 MTNA Certification application cost? There are

currently four more certification grants of \$100 each available to help you with the application cost. All you need to do to apply for a grant is email me after you send in your application to MTNA. I'm looking forward to hearing from the next few teachers who are starting their certification!

Beat Sneak Bandit needs the player to steal back all the clocks by tapping the beat; while TMASG requires students to help the sheep jump over obstacles by tapping to the beat. MUSICAL CREATIVITY

Magic Piano (Android/iOS) and **Dust Buster** (iOS) are two apps that help students create music by just tapping on the screen, no keyboard or fingerings needed. The students generally need to already know the song in order to tap the falling dots/ germs in time, but as a way of teaching

EXPLORING SOUNDS

There are a lot of apps out there that forego traditional notation and just let players explore with sound. **Falling Stars** (iOS), **Jelly Band** (Android/iOS) and **Isle of Tune** (iOS) are just a few that I keep on my ipad for students to experiment with. They all loop different motifs according to how the player arranges icons or draws on the screen, so students can learn about patterns while listening for timbre, instruments, etc.
