have an opportunity for you..."

Those words will bring a knowing smile to any former student of Margaret Saunders Ott. One never knew what might be waiting behind that phrase. It might be a soloist or ensemble in need of a pianist, a paid(!) holiday gig at the country club, perhaps a fellow student needing help with a reception after their senior recital... or even be a ride home for Puppy the poodle from the dog groomers... it could be anything! No matter what the mission, it was met with an


irresistible urge to say, "Yes!"

There's a wonderful sense of satisfaction in being able to help someone you love and admire, especially when you're virtually guaranteed of being showered with words of appreciation. That was all part of the reward of accepting one of Mrs. Ott's "opportunities." Looking back, however, I realize there was so much more going on. By asking her students to help someone out (including herself), she taught us how much we mattered and were needed in this world, at a time when we needed to know that the most. Learning how to perform well on stage with confidence and poise can be overwhelming, especially alongside amazing fellow students, not to mention all of the other turmoil taking place in a young adult life.

A plethora of studies point to the act of helping others to improve our own sense of well-being regardless of our age. A few years ago, a study by researchers at Carnegie Mellon University showed that older adults who volunteered at least 200 hours per year lowered their risk of developing high blood pressure by a whopping 40 percent (https://www.medicaldaily.com/older-adults-who-volunteer-can-reduce-their-risk-hypertension-40-246802). Perhaps the physical activity of the volunteering was a contributor, but it's an impressive statistic nonetheless.

Over the past year while visiting chapters around the state, I have observed countless examples of members encouraging colleagues and students to give and grow. A shining example is in Lewis County. A year ago, President Karen Monroe attended our Leadership Seminar with young adult board member Selah Newkirk, who has been mentored into leadership by her more seasoned colleagues. This year, Selah will serve as Chapter President. Bravo, Selah and members of Lewis County, for caring passionately about the future of music education in your community!

Regardless of our age, the research is clear: volunteering is good for us. As we prepare to begin a new academic year, let's be mindful of the benefits of giving back. By providing "opportunities" both large and small for our students and colleagues, we will be offering others a chance to increase their sense of life satisfaction. The harvest will continue far beyond our own lives.

GRANTS, WAIVERS, AND SCHOLARSHIPS

You can find more information and applications on the website on the grants and enrichments page, but here is the list of grants and other enrichments available to you, your students, and your chapter:

- Small chapter grant (for workshop assistance up to \$500 for chapters with 25 or fewer members)
- Collegiate chapter grant (up to \$300 for events the collegiate chapter would like to present)
- District grant (up to \$500 for District conference assistance)
- Lois Whitner Study grant (to be used to offset the cost of music lessons, theory or composition classes, or tuition for music camps)
- Collegiate to Active Member Dues grant
- Caroline Allen Certification grant (pay for half the cost of obtaining certification)
- State dues waiver
- State Conference fees waiver

It's easy to do but if you can always let me know if you would like me to complete the request for the insurance for you. The insurance covers your chapter events whether you make this request or not; it is a certificate of proof of insurance should your venue require it. Remember, this liability insurance is only available to chapters, not individuals.

t's fall and time for visiting artists (formerly known as adjudicators) to begin thinking about our biennial meeting in Yakima which is associated with the annual WSTMA Leadership Seminar. This is a time for us to recharge, to share our skills, to find out if certain problems are cropping up regularly enough to address and to have fun in our unique way. (Where else can we hear a story about the first grader who plays his 8 measure piece through very nicely and then turns to one of us and says "Do you have any questions?")

The time frame has changed slightly due to conflicts at the venue we use, which is the Hilton Garden Inn, 401 E. Yakima Ave. Instead of holding this on a weekend in September, this year, it will take place the evening of October 5 (Friday) and the morning of October 6th (Saturday). Usually we meet somewhere nearby for a meal and a drink sometime around 5:30 on Friday afternoon and adjourn to the hotel meeting room from 7-9,

then meet the following morning from 9-11 or so, exact schedule TBD. As usual, WSMTA will partially defray the cost of your hotel room. 

As MLP Chair for WSMTA, I wish you and your chapter success in this year's testing. Here are a few reminders and helpful hints to assist in making your testing go as smoothly as possible.

- All Tests, Keys and Helps should say "Music Literacy Program" (revised 2017). The audio Listening CD has not changed.
- When Registrations are collected with testing fee, you no longer need to send a copy of the registrations to me.
- Fill out the "Participation Profile" found on the WSMTA website or found in the Misc. folder on the CD, and email that to me. It tells me who the chapter is, chair of the event, date of event, place, how many teachers and students registered and theory number per level.
- New point sheets for Rhythm were (10) and are now 20. New point sheets for Sight-Playing were (20) and are now 30.
- Technique starting at Level 4 there are now points for the student playing both the Natural minor scale and the Harmonic minor scale.
- Theory tests and keys were reviewed and errors or alignments were corrected.

- All Tests and Keys along with Misc. Folder will be on 1 CD. This year I will hand out Set 1 (even year 2019) at the Leadership conference this year so check with your president to receive the new material.
- Everything on the WSMTA website has been updated including the handbook, registrations and all guides.
- When your MLP event is finished, the MLP chair will
 use the Theory score sheet on the Misc. File to record
 all Theory scores and send a copy to me. I will no
 longer need you to send me all the scores from the
 different testing areas, just the Written Theory.

Pedal Points: You're Going to Make Mistakes

t was the day of my masters degree organ recital. I was in a back hallway of the church pacing a bit when my organ professor stopped by. Our conversation went like this:

"Why are you pacing?"
"I'm a bit nervous for my recital."
"Why? You're well prepared."
"I know. But I want to play well."
"You play every week in church, you know. The people who came to your

recital today came because they want to hear you play. Just play today like you do every week."

"Hmm. Okay."

"You know— you're going to make mistakes."

"You're going to make mistakes." In one sentence, my professor was allowing me to be human. And as humans, we make mistakes.

Let me be clear—he was not condoning sloppy playing. He expected me to be fully prepared for performance. But, by acknowledging that, yes, I will make mistakes, he was allowing me the freedom to trust my preparation and fully immerse myself in making music.

As organists, we train our students and ourselves to play in public on a regular basis—usually every week. In order to have the freedom to "make mistakes," we have no choice but to plan ahead so we can be fully prepared.

To help myself become fully prepared, I've found that building and maintaining a spreadsheet for church music is helpful. This spreadsheet serves dual purposes. First, it allows me to put my advance plans in writing. Second, it helps me keep track of when I've played a piece so that I don't repeat it too frequently.

Amassing a repertoire that can be played on short notice for a variety of occasions is essential for working church musicians. Planning music for ourselves and our students that is easy enough to perform well is part of the plan. It is better to perform easy music well than to play difficult music poorly. It is

also essential to have these easier pieces in our repertoire for those inevitable weeks when illness or other circumstances arise—yet we still must play for the church service on the weekend. Having easier pieces in the repertoire can greatly reduce stress. There have been countless times that I have planned several months in advance to play a more difficult piece, but the piece wasn't quite ready. Having repertoire that is ready to go is a life-saver!

While on the topic of stress-reduction, in order to have a happy December, September is the time to plan and begin practicing music for the busy time from the end of November through the new year. As I told a planning-averse choir director who once called me at 4:00PM on Christmas Eve to let me



know what I would be playing at the 9:00PM service that evening "Christmas is not a surprise." Surprises are fine for birthdays, but not for church services.

Avoiding surprises by planning ahead for the holidays and the rest of the year is one of the best gifts organists can give themselves. Planning and preparation allow us to make the mistakes that are arise from our humanity as we freely perform our music.

- Involve Parents
- Offer a Referral Bonus
- Connect to your Community
- Hold Performance Events
- Develop a relationship with your local Music Store(s)
- Develop an Online Presence: Your own website;
 Facebook page; Yelp; Google My Business*
- Get involved in MTNA, WSMTA and your Local Chapter! Networking, establishing good relationships and collaborating with colleagues go a long way toward building your reputation as an Independent Music Teaching professional.
- Be Professional! Create studio policies, communication tools and materials that reflect your style and teaching philosophy.
