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PROPOSED BY-LAWS CHANGE

Karen Hollenback, NCTM, WSMTA President

At the January 2021 Board of Directors meeting, a change to the current Bylaws was proposed and discussed.

This wording change is an effort to continue focusing on the strategic plan adopted by the Board in January 2018 and to facilitate ongoing short and long range planning for WSMTA. As required by our By-laws, the proposed change is presented here:

CURRENT BYLAWS WORDING:

Article XI: Committees

Section 3. Development Committee

The Development Committee shall be responsible for continuous study of WSMTA structure, services and membership, for study and development of short and long range goals and for making recommendations based on these studies. The Immediate Past President may serve as Chair of this Committee. Other members shall include the President, President-Elect, Vice-President, Education Board Chair, the Treasurer, and one or more additional active members appointed by the President.

PROPOSED BYLAWS WORDING:

Article XI: Committees

Section 3. Steering Committee

The Steering Committee will be responsible for reviewing WSMTA's structure and services. Based on those reviews they will offer guidance and advice to the Board of Directors, and provide strategic direction in the development of short and long range goals for the organization. The committee shall include the President, President-Elect, Vice-President, Education Board Chair, Treasurer, Immediate Past President and one or more additional active members appointed by the President. The chair of this committee will be selected from the members of the committee by a vote of the committee members.

As required by our By-laws, this wording change has been reviewed and approved by MTNA.

This proposed change will be formally presented to the membership at the opening session of the WSMTA Conference in June 2021. Voting by the membership on the change will occur at the closing session of the WSMTA Conference in June 2021.


This month we'll be exploring some past WSMTA Conference Booklets. Each year's convention had its own booklet, and while some things have remained the same (thanking conference planning committee members and the President's opening address, for example), others are unique.

The 1962 convention in Bellingham included "Elevenses" on its Canadian Day, and a hand-drawn map of the region by Mr. Gordon Curzon.

The 1927 program had a session on the "Choral Music of Bach with a Vocal Quartet Demonstration" and tea at Mrs. Weyerhaeuser's Garden. Also in 1927, a new railway regulation permitted conference attendees to ride at "one and one-half fare rates... from all points in Washington, Portland, Oregon, and on the Great Northern Railway in British Columbia." Discussions included how to present Sight Singing in Public School music classes (Movable Doh, The Ward System, "A New System called Intervalia") and the "Problems of Modern Piano Teaching" among others.

The 1987 convention included a presentation on "String Materials and Techniques for the Middle Ages" and the premier of WSMTA Commissioned Composer Bern Herbolsheimer's *Sonata for Marimba*.

While the 2021 WSMTA Conference will be virtual, our talented Communications Coordinator will still be creating a


conference booklet that will help us all have a positive experience. The booklet will be mailed to all those who registered by May 28th, and will be available digitally to all conference attendees.

2021 MTNA Performance Competitions

The 2021 MTNA Performance Competition will be held Friday-Sunday, November 12-14 at Central Washington University in Ellensburg, WA. Registration must be completed on-line at the MTNA website. The deadline for registration is September 15, 2021 at 12:00 P.M. PACIFIC time (3:00 P.M. EASTERN time). Competition guidelines and other information can be found online at www.mtna.org Click on Engage, and Competitions will be at the top of the list.

The Chamber Music Competitions are a two-tier competition: the preliminary round, by video submission only; and the final round, live at the MTNA National Conference. Ensembles will compete without regard to the state or division in which they live or take lessons, and seven ensembles will be selected in both the String and Wind categories from a nationwide pool of applicants to compete in the final round.

Hymns for Healing

Like many of you, I am working through the excellent online sessions from this year's MTNA National Conference. Todd Frazier, director of Houston Methodist Hospital's Center for Performing Arts Medicine, presented an illuminating keynote session on how the inclusion of music and the arts as an integral part of the hospital's mission is changing

lives. Surveys of staff, patients, and the community have shown an increase in satisfaction with the hospital itself as well as a reduction in stress levels within the hospital since these programs have been implemented.

Particularly fascinating to me was how brain activation and functional connectivity is being studied with the goal of being able to rehabilitate people who have lost part of their brain function. Video footage showed a patient who had lost his speech because a stroke had damaged the frontal left brain that regulates speech, thereby making traditional speech therapy ineffective. A music therapist was brought in. The music therapist used the patient's favorite song to activate the undamaged frontal right side of the brain that regulates melody and rhythm. During music therapy, singing was used to stimulate speech and the patient was able to successfully communicate again. What was the song that allowed this patient to regain the ability to communicate again? "Amazing Grace." Hymns stay with people. Hymns heal.



I have personally seen how hymns have reached people with Alzheimer's disease so severe that they could not communicate and did not even recognize their own families. In one case, a woman in this condition spontaneously sang every word of "Jesus Loves Me" when I played it as an instrumental solo during a service. In another case, a retired Naval officer with Alzheimer's disease who had been quite agitated settled down immediately when he heard the Navy hymn, "Eternal Father, Strong to Save."

Those of us who have spent a lifetime leading the singing of hymns are well-aware of the healing power of hymns. The melodies of hymns are usually well-crafted, memorable, and easy to sing. The poetry and theology of the text is full of depth and richness. During times of trial, mourning, and hardship, hymns provide edification and comfort. When I play for funerals and memorial services, the bereaved family often requests a special hymn or two. When a former student of mine had a baby that required intensive care due to a difficult delivery, she told me that mentally singing the hymns of her childhood helped her through the despair of wondering if her baby was going to survive.

So— "what's that got to do with me," you may ask? Frankly, a lot. As organists, leading the singing of hymns is one of our paramount duties. To lead the hymns well we need to prepare them well—and this takes time, effort, and attention to detail. I have a friend who tells me "I hate those quarter-note hymns." My friend is a person who is well-read and loves music, so I could not understand how this could possibly be! Beethoven's "Ode to Joy" is a "quarter-note hymn!" Then I attended a service at her church. I have heard elementary school bands play with more beautiful phrasing and musicality than this church-pianist did. By the end of the service, I, too, did not want to hear another "quarter -note" hymn. Do we prepare hymns in a way that does justice to them as miniature masterpieces? Or, do we do a last-minute run-through and hope for the best? Will members of our congregations look forward to singing the hymns we lead— or will they also develop a distaste for "quarter-note hymns."



If the members of our congregations are going to have the benefit of hymns to serve as a foundational rock of support and source of healing as they go through the inevitable trials of life, then we need to take hymn preparation seriously so that they will want to sing the hymns. For this reason, I have chosen to present a workshop on thorough hymn preparation at the WSMTA online conference this June. Please join me on Friday, June 18 at 4:15 PM for a live Zoom session titled "Artful Hymn Preparation." Hope to (virtually) see you there!

When Life Gives You Lemons

Because my kids liked to play the Portal video game when they were teens, I just remembered a funny quote:

"When life gives you lemons, don't make lemonade! Make life take the lemons back! Get mad! Demand to see life's manager!

Make life rue the day it thought it could give you lemons!"

At our chapter's "Year In Review" meeting this week, we were able to look back with a good deal of gratitude at how well we coped with the lemons that life threw at us. We engaged over 75 students in six virtual ensembles through synced video performances; produced virtual MAP events and competitions for piano, strings, voice and even percussion (!); helped almost 200 students of piano and strings complete MLP testing within our own studios instead of at our annual, cooperative Music Carnival event; and enjoyed some truly outstanding Zoom workshops at our monthly membership meetings courtesy of guest presenters from all over the country. Take that, lemons!

One of those presenters was Janet Horvath, former associate principal cello of the Minnesota Orchestra, and her topic was "A Musician Afraid of Sound." Through her own journey dealing with occupational hearing loss, she is helping other musicians protect their hearing and advocate for healthier working and learning environments. Because we reached out to Janet to speak to our chapter in January, I was prepared for high-decibel Easter service rehearsals and performances, remembering her cautions and using her recommended earplugs. I have stopped working out my technique in a small basement



"practice room" (seemed like an ideal location when I set it up!), giving my ears a break from concentrated high-pitched sound waves. I highly recommend Janet's live presentation, or check out her book and resources at her website, playinglesshurt.com.

Through our chapter's experience producing online Music Artistry Programs for Strings, Piano and Voice, we've come up with a proven step-by-step procedure that we would like to share with others—specifically, chapters with a handful of voice, string or winds students who would like to participate in MAP but do not have the numbers for an in-person event. Contact me directly if you have questions about this; we'll be sharing more information in the fall.
