### CONFERENCE PRESENTER SPOTLIGHT

Peter Mack: "Marvelous Moderns and their Needlessly Neglected Mid-Level Masterpieces"

In this repertoire lecture, Peter Mack explores mostly modern shorter works, offering an alternative to the triedand-true twentieth century favorites that we hear again and again. There is a vast body of neglected repertoire out there. This demonstration uncovers unknown pieces to spark the



interest of students, teachers, adjudicators, and audiences alike. Most of the pieces played are of mid-range difficulty. Sections from over forty works are performed, and there is an extensive handout in which the difficulty of each piece is assessed, along with its publishing information. It's a fast-moving, fun talk! Nothing in the lecture lasts too long, so if you don't like a work that's being played, don't worry—it will end soon, and there'll be something different coming along right away!

Sarah Silvia: "Communicate Boundaries and Studio Culture With Your Policy"

This year's Clarion articles will introduce you to Chapters which have been honored as a WSMTA Chapter of the Year. Okanogan County Chapter was selected as the second recipient in 2009. #### WSMTA Okanogan County Chapter

Being a "small" chapter caused us to think small sometimes, so it didn't occur to us to apply for WSMTA Chapter of the Year until a visiting teacher suggested it. We certainly have been very active to provide educational opportunities for our students, teachers, and communities, so we applied in 2009. We were very surprised to receive this, not realizing this allowed our chapter to be considered for the National Local Association of the Year 2010. Members at that time were: Elizabeth Grunst, Roz Nau NCTM, Nora Ridenour, Mariliz Romano, Lois Rhoads, Gwyn Kopp, Marla Garr, Jim Kalberer, Sandy Sheets, and Kathleen Christensen.



Our application contained our county demographics to illustrate the problems and benefits of serving in a largely rural area; data about how the chapter began; and our participation in various MTNA/WSMTA events as well as local community functions. Also included were bios/pics of all ten members, details about our activities, and a few pages of programs, photos, and news articles of our events. Because some of us "never throw anything away", we were able to provide the history of our group easily. Kathleen was amused that Carolyn Malnes, Edmonds, commented that "filling in all the blanks of the submission" was extremely important! It does take a commitment to follow through on all the details, but necessary.

We still remember our shock, which was loudly expressed, when President Roz Nau read the letter from Gary Ingle, CEO of MTNA, stating we had won. The \$1000 award was partly used to get members to the National Convention in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

In retrospect, these awards were very effective in reaffirming our purposes as an organization. They also encouraged us during times of less



membership to keep the vision polished. Of course, the money was put to good use for the mission of the whole group. We are still active, but down to four members this year.

These last two years our students were able to perform for virtual and live county recitals and at local Farmers Markets, participate in MAP and MLP, and recently performed at an assisted living facility and at Tonasket's Christmas festival. We still fund scholarships based on excellence and need. We've begun a Facebook page; and we are thankful for the assistance provided by the Association to help us fund visiting artists for MAP and workshops. We are currently working on a project to notify our area of how they can enrich these efforts by their support and donations, promising an intimate concert for any who want it!

### PEDAL POINTS Working for "Exposure"



The email message or phone call usually goes something like this: "We need a pianist/ organist to play for our event. We can't afford to pay you, but it would be great exposure."

We musicians are used to this sort of thing. The problem with this is that "Exposure is not an accepted currency at the bank."

I'd like to differentiate between the volunteer work you choose to do versus work for "exposure." Volunteer work is something you do of your own volition. Sometimes the visibility you get from volunteer work can generate more students or performing opportunities, but your primary motivation for volunteer work is not to further your business.

Working "for exposure" is not volunteer work— it's a business decision. You're trading getting paid in currency for something else. However, before accepting unpaid/low-paid work, do you:

- 1. Ask how much they normally pay someone to do what they are asking you to do for nothing or next-to-nothing?
- 2. Tell them how much your normal fee would be for the work they are asking you to do?
- Negotiate something that can benefit your business? For example, free advertising, introductions to attendees, distribution of promotional materials, ability to sell recordings.

- 4. Determine the likelihood that the people present will engage you or know others who may engage you for paying work in the future?
- 5. Feel free to say that you are unable to accept unpaid or discounted-rate work at this time?

Also consider if accepting unpaid/low-paid work may adversely affect your business. Although working for free may introduce your business to potential clients, these potential clients may expect you to work for free or cheap for them also. Are you unwittingly sending a signal that musical services are of low-value? Will similar businesses need to do unpaid or low-fee work in an effort to remain competitive? Will that cause the market rate for the services that your business offers to fall below the level of profitability and cause you or others to go out of business?

People rarely want to pay for something that they are used to getting for free or cheap. All businesses— including music businesses— need to make money. A business can only stay in business if it makes a profit. When the market rate for goods and services falls below the level of profitability, not only do similar businesses suffer but so does the community. Low prices can't help the consumer if there are not enough businesses in the community that offer the services consumers desire. There are places where parents have difficulty finding qualified music teachers for their children. There are churches that can't find organists because their volunteer/low-paid musician left and the church hasn't budgeted for a musician's salary.

Shaun Flynn summed it up this way in an article in the February/March 2022 issue of *American Music Teacher*: "Passion for performing and teaching is frequently used to exploit musicians. Anyone who has been asked to play for exposure instead of



money has felt this exploitation. Maybe you've been asked to teach for free or provide make-up lessons as a favor. Music teachers cannot survive on exposure and goodwill."

"Music teachers cannot survive on exposure and goodwill"— that pretty much sums it up. "Exposure and goodwill" may, in fact, be hurting the musical

vibrancy of our communities because it may create a business climate where professional musicians/ music teachers cannot economically survive. As professional musicians, we need to give serious thought to the ramifications of our business decisions. Musicians should be able to thrive, not just survive.


#### 2022 Commissioned Work

### STUDENT STUDY GRANTS Call for Lois Whitner Student Study Grant Applications

The WSMTA Student Study Grant Program was established in 2003 with a bequest from the Lois Whitner estate.

The purpose of the program is to provide financial assistance for continued private study to music students who demonstrate financial need and who show serious commitment to music study.

#### Guidelines:

- The grant is open to music students currently in grades 8-11 who have studied a minimum of 4 years. Their teachers must be WSMTA members of at least 12 months standing.
- The applicant will be considered on a basis of **financial need** and **commitment to music study.**
- The applicant must have participated in the WSMTA Music Artistry Program. In view of the extra burden of virtual adjudications caused by COVID surges, this requirement may be waived if the student and teacher fully explain the hardships encountered.

- Grants up to **\$1,600** may be awarded. The applicant must explain specifically and in detail how the funds will be used. The grant will be for a period of one year. Students may re-apply in subsequent years by submitting another full application to the committee for consideration.
- The grant may be used to offset the cost of music lessons, theory, or composition classes, or tuition for music camps. Grant money will be sent directly to the teacher or camp/ program director.
- The application is available at www.wsmta.org/lwgrantapplication. Or, from the homepage of www.wsmta.org, go to Programs for Students > Scholarships.
