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
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
FACILITIES MAP

Inna Faliks, pianist

"Adventurous and passionate" (The New Yorker) Ukrainian-born American pianist Inna Faliks has made a name for herself through her commanding performances of standard piano repertoire, as well as genre-bending interdisciplinary projects, and inquisitive work with contemporary composers. After her acclaimed teenage debuts at the Gilmore Festival and with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, she has appeared on many of the world's great stages in recital and with many major orchestras, performing with conductors Leonard Slatkin, Keith Lockhart and many others. Her recent seasons include performances at Ravinia Festival in Chicago, National Gallery in Washington DC, Chigiana Academy in Italy, as soloist with US orchestras nation-wide, and repeated tours of all the major venues in China.

Ms. Faliks collaborates with and premieres music by some of today's most significant composers, including Billy Childs, Richard Danielpour, Timo Andres and Clarice Assad. She founded the award-winning poetrymusic series Music/Words in 2008, with dozens of performances in New York, Chicago and Los Angeles, both on stage and on WFMT radio. She regularly tours her monologue-recital Polonaise-Fantasie, the Story of a Pianist, which tells the story of her immigration to the United States from Odessa with music by Bach, Chopin, Gershwin and Carter (recorded on Delos).

Inna Faliks' discography includes *Reimagine: Beethoven & Ravel* (Navona, 2021), for which she commissioned nine composers to respond to Beethoven's Bagatelles op 126 and Ravel's *Gaspard de la Nuit*. Also released in 2021 (MSR Classics) is The Schumann Project, Volume 1, which includes Clara Schumann's G minor sonata and Robert Schumann's Symphonic Etudes opus 13. Other releases include all-Beethoven and Rachmaninoff/Ravel/Pasternak discs for MSR Classics, and *The Master and Margarita* project, featuring three world premieres on Sono Luminus (2022).

Ms. Faliks is professor and head of Piano Studies at UCLA, and in demand world-wide as a masterclass artist and adjudicator. She is also a published writer, with articles and essays appearing in *Los Angeles Times* and *The Washington Post*, among other media outlets. A musical memoir, titled *Weight in the Fingertips*, will be published in 2023 by Globe Pequot. Inna Faliks is a Yamaha Artist.

2022 COMMISSIONED COMPOSER OF THE YEAR



Shlomo Farber

Shlomo Farber was born in Israel and relocated to the Portland/Vancouver area to be close to family. With passion for jazz, classical music, folk tunes, and film music, Shlomo earned degrees in piano performance, composition, and Cinematic orchestration. A former member of the Portland Symphonic Choir, Shlomo won their competition for choral music composition in 2018. As a multi-disciplinary musician, Shlomo has played in various jazz ensembles in the Portland area and is pursuing a career as a film composer. Maintaining a teaching studio, Shlomo works with students of all ages and has developed learning games for his students. Shlomo's music has been performed by various orchestral and choral ensembles including the Prague Philharmonic Orchestra. Shlomo has recently joined Oregon's National Guard Band and is a recent graduate of the U.S. Army School of Music.

Nocturne for Cello and Piano

Shlomo Farber's commissioned work will premier at the Washington Winners & Commissioned Composer of the Year Concert on Thursday, June 23, 2022 at 7:00 pm.

Nocturne for Cello and Piano

The past years have been giving humanity a large dose of adversity. As music is a form of therapy, this piece encapsulates a combination of an existential struggle along with the yearning for a resolution and a hope for a brighter future. The harmonic language is largely influenced by jazz and film music and the structure combines various elements of traditional forms such as sonata and rondo. The piece is entitled "Nocturne" as it features a melodic line with repetitive accompanying textures. However, it brings a new interpretation to the genre. In this context, the nocturne is featuring some of the darkness that the night brings along with a few glimpses of light.

Performer Biographies

Nocturne for Cello and Piano will be performed by Ryan Babe, cellist, and Douglas Schneider, pianist.

Ryan Babe, a cellist from Salem, Oregon, is currently pursuing an undergraduate degree in cello performance at Rice University's Shepherd School of

Music. At the Shepherd School, he studies with Professor Desmond Hoebig, and previously studied with Oregon Symphony assistantprincipal cellist Marilyn de Oliveira and Andrea Chandler.



Ryan has been honored with awards at various solo

competitions in Oregon, including most notably the 2021 Philips Family Award for first place instrumentalist at the Monday Music Club of Portland and 1st prize at the 2019 Vernon L. Wiscarson Soloist Competition. He has also performed as a soloist with the MYSfits Chamber Orchestra of Portland, Oregon.

Ryan has performed in masterclasses for cellists including Johannes Moser, Mark Kosower, Brannon Cho, and Silver Ainomäe. His summer festival activities include the 2018 and 2020 International Cello Institute, as well as the 2019 Meadowmount School of Music, where he studied with Northwestern University Professor Hans Jørgen Jensen. **Douglas Schneider** is one of the finest, most experienced, and versatile keyboardists in the Pacific Northwest. Upon moving to Oregon from Chicago in 2002, Mr. Schneider was the principal accompanist for Portland Opera. He then served on the faculty of the School of Music at Portland State University for over a

decade, including one year as the acting chair of the piano department. For the last several years, Mr. Schneider has been a



principal pianist and keyboardist with the Oregon Symphony, having performed with them in over one hundred concerts on a wide range of keyboard instruments, including piano, organ, harpsichord, fortepiano, celeste, and synthesizer. He has been featured several times with the Oregon Symphony in prominent roles, whether as the organ soloist in Saint-Saens' Organ Symphony, solo pianist in a movement of Mozart's Piano Concerto No. 20 for the orchestra's accompaniment of the movie Amadeus, or playing solo jazz piano interludes alongside the renowned singer Renee Fleming.

As a free-lance pianist, organist, and harpsichordist Mr. Schneider has performed in nearly two thousand recitals, as well as appearing with many of the Northwest's leading ensembles, including the Oregon Bach Festival, the Portland Symphonic Choir, Cappella Romana, 45th Parallel, the Oregon Music Festival, the Northwest Boy Choir of Seattle, Cantores in Ecclesia, In Mulieribus, and the Alaska Chamber Singers. He has also performed in dozens of musical theater productions at Portland's Keller Auditorium, including national tours of Hairspray, Wicked, A Chorus Line, Aladdin, and Charlie and the Chocolate Factory.

Mr. Schneider is currently the Director of Sacred Music/ Organist at St. Joseph Church in Salem, having previously served as the Principal Organist at Portland's Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception and as the Assistant Organist at Chicago's Holy Name Cathedral. Douglas grew up in St. Paul, Minnesota, and graduated as valedictorian of Woodbury High School. He attended Lawrence University, where he also graduated as valedictorian, earning degrees in history and music.


