2022 WSMTA State Conference: We Did It!

Dear WSMTA Members,

We did it! We had our first in-person conference in 3 years! It was wonderful to catch up with all those able to come to Lower Columbia College in Longview. Hearing the music live was a real pleasure. Thank you to the many volunteers, presenters, organizers, and our guest artist, Inna Faliks.

As many of you know, shortly before the conference there was disagreement from some members about our COVID attendance policy. Our conference attendance policy required everyone attending the conference to show either a proof of vaccination or a negative COVID test result (PCR or NAAT) taken within 48 hours. Mask use was optional. I thought I would take a moment to clarify WSMTA's stance, as some members felt excluded by this policy.

Our 2022 conference attendance policy was crafted as a courtesy to protect those who are particularly vulnerable to COVID: those who are immunocompromised or with underlying medical conditions; those who are elderly; those with elderly parents, or young children or grandchildren at home.





We all needed to do our part to prevent the conference from becoming a super spreader event. That began with each one of us taking on personal responsibility to be aware of our own COVID status and proactively protect others from being unwittingly infected.

COVID is highly contagious even before the infected person experiences any symptoms. Vaccination helps to reduce the severity of the disease, but it is not bullet-proof. In catching up with many of you at the conference, we came to realize that the number of members personally impacted by COVID in the past two years was far higher than we had expected. While some recovered well, some are still struggling with lingering conditions such as fatigue and other neurological conditions.

Was imposing an attendance policy in violation of our organization's bylaws? WSMTA Board of Directors does not think so. While bylaws list some basic membership rights, such as the right to attend meetings, the right to hold office, and the right to enter students in Association programs, they do not state how these membership rights are implemented. Bylaws are supplemented with guidelines and policies. For example, the right to hold office does not mean that everyone can become an officeholder without complying with an election procedure; the right to enter students in Association programs does not mean a teacher gets to enter an entire studio in the Honors Recital without going through a selection process.

Our attendance policy did not require anyone to file any claim of religious or medical reasons to be exempt from showing proof of vaccination. Everyone was exempt from having to show a proof of vaccination as long as they could show a negative COVID test result, taken within 48 hours.

Our attendance policy was supported by WA State's Department of Health. Washington State's Department of Health's current Guidance for Non-Healthcare Businesses and Organizations stated: (https://doh.wa.gov/sites/default/files/legacy/Documents/1600/coronavirus//420-350-NonHealthCareBusiness.pdf)

"Businesses and organizations may request proof of COVID-19 vaccination from customers. Businesses are encouraged to require documentation of COVID-19 vaccination of customers through an official record, as opposed to personal attestation or an honor system. Verification of vaccination status is not a violation of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) Privacy Rule."

For those unable to attend the conference in person or not willing to comply with the attendance policy, we did offer a virtual option at a much lower registration fee. The Virtual Conference included highlights of the conference, livestreams of our invited artist Inna Faliks' presentation, masterclass, and concert. It also included a Virtual Swag Bag, a digital copy of the conference booklet, and access to the Virtual Exhibit Hall.

We believe we made every reasonable accommodation to encourage conference registration. We all have to make choices. At WSMTA, we strive to put our fellow teachers' welfare ahead of our personal interests. Everyone on the Board of Directors is your fellow teacher volunteering their time to make sure we can provide the programs that benefit our teachers. We are not faceless bureaucrats. We are not politicians. We might have five minutes between our own students to answer urgent emails. We try to be courteous and respectful to every teacher in our association. And moving forward, we hope that we can all put aside the differences, see each other beyond political labels, and proactively look out for each other's welfare—that is the real value of our association.

I look forward to visiting with you in the 2022-2023 school year.

MUSIC ARTISTRY PROGRAM (MAP)

Preparing for Your MAP Event

For those MAP Chairs thinking ahead, I have updated our Visiting Artist List. There were five new Visiting Artists approved in January. I expect that we will be approving a couple more Visiting Artists in June. To access the list, please log on the WSMTA website and look under your Member Dashboard.

This is my first year running MAP from the WSMTA perspective. Previously my experience was limited to running MAP events at the chapter level. Now that I have seen the income and expenditure from both sides, I thought I would quickly share some tips on how to run MAP events in a financially sustainable way. First, let's walk through the income and expenses, so you can understand all of the pieces of this complex puzzle.

INCOME:

The income of each MAP event is from the student and teacher registration fees. You can find that number at the top of the MAP Teacher Summary Report for your Chapter. Clearly, as a MAP Chair the best way to boost the income is to encourage participation: introducing new members to MAP, increasing the program visibility with regular announcements at Chapter meetings and in newsletters, for example.

EXPENDITURES:

- 1. **Visiting Artist Pay.** Visiting Artists are paid at \$43/hr ("assessment time", referring to all of the scheduled time except lunches).
- 2. **Visiting Artist Travel Expense.** Travel Expense consists of lodging, meals and mileage (or

- flight). Each chapter has a cap on the hotel rate per day depending on the location. Meal reimbursement is limited to \$35/day. Mileage (which may also include flights, rental cars, and other transportation related expenses) is capped at \$300 per event for each Visiting Artist.
- 3. Chapter Reimbursement of venue/tuning. This is capped at \$100 per 8 hours of assessment time.
- 4. **Credit Card transaction fees**. This is roughly about 3% of the registration fees.

Visiting Artist Pay and Visiting Artist Travel Expense are the major portion of the WSMTA MAP expenses and they are prioritized in payment. That means I pay those first, then whatever is leftover may be distributed as Chapter Reimbursement.

What happens if the registration fees could not cover the Visiting Artist Pay and Travel Expense?

This does happen, especially in some smaller events. In that case, we may not be able to reimburse the chapters for the venue/tuning expenses. That means the chapters will need to absorb those expenses. Most chapters collect a separate Student Chapter Fee or Teacher Chapter Fee for that reason.

Travel expense should be a major consideration in your decision of Visiting Artist. We encourage chapters to hire Visiting Artists from outside of their area, but there is a limit on what makes sense. A good rule of thumb is that the travel expense should be about 25%-35% of Visiting Artist's pay. If a Visiting Artist is coming from really far and needs flight and rental car, their assignment should not be so short that their travel expense is about the same as their pay. Short term assignments ideally should be filled by Visiting Artists closer to you. Chapters can further help to curb the travel expenses by offering to pick up the Visiting Artist from the airport and ask teachers to drive between the lodging to the venue.



When you review the Financial Report by Chapter, which will be sent to you once we close the book on the 2022 MAP, if your Visiting Artist's travel expense is about the same as their pay, please try to control the cost of your chapter or anticipate the deficit by collecting a Student Chapter Fee or Teacher Chapter Fee event next year.

INTERVIEW WITH MARGEE WEBSTER BY SUZANNE GRANT

My favorite part of organizing our Music Artistry Program is meeting and getting to know the incredibly talented Visiting Artists that come to work with our students. They always impress me with their expertise and skill, but also, and most importantly, with the compassion and patience that they bring to their work with our students. Even when working on

Zoom, they are able to reach through the screen with empathy and are able to gently push our students to understand how to achieve higher levels of artistry and musicianship in their playing.

Margee Webster was one of these amazing Visiting Artists. Margee has taught piano for more than 30 years and recently retired from Gonzaga University. Her piano studies began at age 6, culminating with a Summa cum Laude Bachelor of Arts Degree in Music/Piano Pedagogy from Whitworth University.

As an active member of MTNA and WSMTA, she has served in many capacities including WSMTA President, WSMTA Education Board Chair, MTNA Competitions Washington State Chair and Chapter President for the Spokane MTA. She recently received the MTNA Foundation Fellow Award.

I asked Margee to answer some questions for this article.

How long have you been a Visiting Artist? Since 2005. My students have been involved in Auditions, then Adjudications, and now MAP for over 40(!) years.

What do you enjoy about being a Visiting Artist?

First and foremost, it is an honor and privilege to work with the students in MAP. I love the fast pace and the challenge of figuring out how best to connect with the students so they will be encouraged to keep practicing, keep loving music and keep expressing themselves through their music. I also enjoy meeting and talking with the teachers because we have a connection; we have a common goal of sharing our passion for music with our students.

As a Visiting Artist, do you coach students differently than your own students?

It's different in that I am seeing and hearing the students in MAP for the very first time. When I hear the student, my job is like putting icing on the cake; the hard work has already been done by their teachers. With my own students I am with them weekly, from when they first get the music to the finished product.

What advice would you give teachers in preparing their students for MAP?

Be sure the students understand that it's the process of learning a piece where musical growth occurs. It's a fun event that should be celebrated. Be 120% prepared. Dress up. Be respectful, responsive, and open to what the Visiting Artist has to say.



What would you do if a student is so nervous that he or she could not finish playing?

This has happened to a few of my own students. If the student is 6-8 years old, I would bring the music to the piano and sit with them. Give them a minute or two to calm down then have a little conversation with them—about anything. When I put the music up on the rack for them to see they usually recover and "dive" right into the piece. For older students, I give them a few minutes to compose themselves. Sometimes I've led them through the "box" breathing technique to help calm them down. They, too, recover remarkably well and usually finish their piece with renewed energy and resolve.

How have you felt about the need for video submissions instead of taking part in live MAP events?

Exhausted! (Insert smile). I feel fortunate we have been able to carry on our programs because of the technology available to us in this day and age but there is no substitute for an in-person venue.

What do you enjoy most about MAP?

I can't narrow it down to just one thing...I enjoy the whole process!

UPDATE FROM THE EQUITY, INCLUSION, AND DIVERSITY TASK FORCE

Marketing Strategies for Independent Music Teachers

MARKETING STRATEGIES FOR INDEPENDENT MUSIC TEACHERS

What does marketing mean to you as an independent music teacher? There are many facets to being an entrepreneur (which you surely are as a music teacher) such as branding, sales, marketing, operations, and finance. Marketing, related to our great work, means any action or strategy you execute with the goal of getting new students. "How can I get new students?"

Conventional wisdom encourages running ads, hanging flyers, building social media followings, or focusing on SEO (search engine optimization) for your website. Through speaking directly with hundreds of successful teachers in recent years, I've observed traits and practices that illuminate another approach to building your studio. A sustainable path to marketing your great work costs nothing except a willingness to do your best work and measure its value wisely.

Here are three areas of focus that when combined, will market your work sustainably and effectively.

Do great work. It may seem obvious, but great, caring, thoughtful, intentional work is the most important thing you can do to get more students. Any experienced teacher will tell you that word of mouth is a powerful marketing tool. Your students are like brilliant billboards, promoting your name and approach within their communities. A new student referral from a trusted client is much more likely to convert (signup) than someone who discovered you from a Google ad.

Build a community around your great work. Bring your students together for recitals, masterclasses, group activities. Encourage them to support each other and enjoy the process of learning together. I host an annual recital called the Guitarbeque where I'll invite all of my students, their families, and their friends. Over 200 people show up for a day of music and fun. I get more new students from that single event than anything else I do, and it's the only paid marketing I do throughout the year. Give your students something to talk about, or to feel wonderful about, and your studio will grow.

Let your community support you (charge appropriately). Charging a professional rate for your services is the most powerful tool you can leverage in attracting new clients and remaining content in your career. Customers will often imagine

a service to be better if it costs more. Compare two providers, offering the exact same service, where one charges more. The person charging more will often receive more business, because customers assume they are better or more experienced due to their advertised cost. Our industry has historically undervalued the great work we do and feared charging an appropriate, professional rate commensurate with our education and impact. Charging a professional rate is a marketing tool!

Do great work, build community, and charge professionally. Focusing your resources on any one

or all of these areas will transform your marketing and help you maintain a vibrant studio.
