## MARSHA WRIGHT COMMISSIONED SONATINA AWARD



Seattle Music Teachers Association launched The Marsha Wright Commissioned Sonatina Award as a means to support student and teacher composers, and encourage composition of new sonatinas. The award alternates between WSMTA teachers in odd-numbered years, and student composers in even-numbered years. This season the award will go to a WSMTA teacher-composer. The award is \$750.

We are looking for an early-intermediate level sonatina in three movements, for solo, duet or trio involving any combination of piano, flute, and/or violin. A nod to traditional sonata-allegro form is welcome but not necessary; any brief work in several movements will qualify as a sonatina. What is most important is that all parts be playable by early-intermediate level students.

WSMTA teacher members should send 3 to 5 samples of Intermediate level composition by November 1. The works will be reviewed anonymously by a panel of SMTA members, who will choose one composer by December 1. The commissioned composer will submit a finished piece by February 15. The Marsha Wright Commissioned Sonatina Award is \$750, paid upon submission of the final piece.

#### Send the following by November 1:

- A brief email to smtaoffice@gmail.com stating your full name, email, phone number, and your chapter in WSMTA. Please put "Sonatina Festival commission submission" in the subject line.
- A PDF file of your original score(s), with no identifying information in the document itself. (Compositions will be renamed by random number assignment in order to ensure anonymity before being reviewed.
- MP3 or WAV audio file

The new sonatina will be premiered at The Marsha Wright Sonatina Festival in April, 2023. If the composer has a student in mind while they are creating the piece, we welcome that student to perform in the Sonatina Festival.

The award is named in honor of the Sonatina Festival's founder and is supported by a generous gift from Dorothy Woodcock.

#### Suggestions/guidelines for an early-intermediate level piece:

- Limit the key signature to 1 or 2 sharps or flats.
- Meters: compound time such as 6/8 is OK.
- Piano: compare to a Clementi sonatina
- Violin: compare to Suzuki Volume 3
- Flute: Compare to ABRSM Grade 5 or below

## INDEPENDENT MUSIC TEACHERS FORUM No Unanswered Questions: Recap of the IMTF Session at Conference

## RECAP OF THE IMTF SESSION AT THE WSMTA CONFERENCE—PART ONE

It was an absolute delight to see so many of you attend the "IMTF Musical Jeopardy!" session at the June Conference. The 22 of us discussed topics from five Categories: **Marketing/Building Your Studio, Resources, Policies, Community/ Collaboration,** and **Self-Care**.

For this article, I'd like to share the group's ideas on Policies and Resources. The start of the school year, and for many of us the start of our teaching year, is the ideal time to create studio policies and acquire resources to help bolster your lesson plans.

#### Let's start with **Policies**.

- Everyone agreed that it is important to create a clear, written policy with sign-off from the student or student's parents. This policy should include tuition rates, payment options and due date, cancellation and/or make-up lesson policy, and more.
- Specify what circumstances warrant a make-up lesson: illness? Emergency? Broken bones? Decide how flexible you want to be and communicate clearly to students what you accept as a valid reason to do a make-up lesson or credit the student's account.

- Establish an "exit" policy for students who wish to leave your studio. Many of us require a 30-day notice of termination or payment of tuition in lieu of notice.
- Several teachers maintain "Trade/Exchange" lists to make it easier to avoid giving makeup lessons. Students opt in to the list and can communicate directly with each other to swap lesson times.
- Given the current state of public health challenges, many of us have a "hygiene" policy. While some may require masks, distancing and other pandemic-related precautions, an ongoing hygiene/safety policy helps decrease risk for normal, seasonal colds and flus.
- In short, create a clear policy and "stick with it!"

## CERTIFICATION CORNER Become Nationally Certified in Piano, Voice, Violin, Flute, and Organ!

It was my pleasure to share about the five teacher profile projects of National Certification at the WSMTA Conference in Longview, Washington this June.

My favorite aspect of being Certification Chair is meeting teachers from all around the state and hearing them speak from their heart as to why they continue to teach music. Some questions I asked at the Conference included, "what systems support you as a musician and educator? What are the values that lead you in the lessons with your students?" Reconnecting with our values as individuals and teachers supports an environment rooted in integrity and growth. Whether you teach piano, voice, violin, flute or organ, MTNA offers the Certification program for you to complete 5 teacher profile projects and receive National Certification. Also, Washington State Music Teachers Association offers a \$100 grant that covers half of the application cost. If you're a collegiate member, the grant covers the entire application cost for Certification!

## MUSIC LITERACY PROGRAM Implement MLP in Your Studio and Chapter this Year!

Happy fall, y'all! I hope your studios are shaping up, and you're gearing up for an exciting new year of teaching! Now is the time to be thinking about implementing the Music Literacy Program in your chapter and studio this year. We are working to streamline the process online for registration, chapter participation profiles, certificates etc., as well as the testing process itself. My goal is to have set 1 tests with grading guidelines, facilitator FAQs and a brand new how-to presentation together before the Leadership Seminar in September.

The MLP can look different for each studio and chapter, depending on your preferences. Don't feel up to implementing the whole program? Try one area of study! Really focus on rhythm with your students this year, and have them all take that test! The MLP does not have to be all or nothing! You also do not have to go all-out in your chapter like KMTA does. Testing can be done online via Zoom, or in individual studios!

In the past, the guidelines have required that teachers cannot grade their own students' tests, but considering that you are the person to whom the results matter, grade away! The only stipulation is that your chapter chair must validate honors or high honors status for the theory exams. It is my hope that by making the program continuously more user -friendly, more and more chapters can begin to use this amazing teaching tool. I'm available for chapter visits this year, if you'd like me to come and help you out! Have fun, and happy teaching!

meeting back in July, so that we can hit the ground running at our September membership kick-off meeting.

I am thankful to be in a large and supportive chapter representing a great diversity of instruments taught – we even have a percussion teacher in our ranks. So for years now, those who plan for our membership meeting topics have been mindful of this diversity of interest when choosing topics and inviting guest speakers to instruct and inspire us. We have also occasionally provided parallel programs for different instrument categories. In one of our chapter meetings, as a piano composer spoke to the piano teachers, the string teachers gathered to share favorite lesserknown teaching materials.

If this isn't something that your chapter has considered: why not give it a try this year, and extend an invitation to the instrumental and vocal teachers that you know and would like to bring into your teaching community? Here are some presentation topics that will draw in any music teacher!

- Studio administration and management: including policies, interpersonal communication (especially with parents), technology, organization, scheduling, finances...
- Practice and memorization strategies for ALL instruments
- Student incentives
- Cross-discipline collaboration and ensembles
- Community engagement and outreach
- Planning the studio calendar
- Recital themes and ideas
- Online lesson tips & tricks
- Underrepresented composers who wrote for a variety of instruments and ability levels
- Alexander Technique for a variety of instruments
- Preparing for Music Literacy Program testing for ALL instruments
- MTNA Certification for ALL instruments

WSMTA has a Workshop List of excellent in-state speakers and their topics – it's on the Member Dashboard page, so you will need to log in to see it. And if you want to go further afield and can incorporate a remote live feed into your chapter meetings, you can invite an online presenter who gave an interesting workshop at the national conferences of MTNA, ASTA (strings), NATS (voice), NFA (flute) etc. Check each organization's conference information on their website to see if you can view their workshop list.

Finally: I will be reaching out again to our V&I cohort to determine interest in online statewide MAP programs. The woodwinds will almost definitely be having one again. Please contact me individually at any time with your questions or requests for this program!



## ARTS ADVOCACY Share the Wealth of WSMTA!

In my role as WSMTA Arts Advocacy Chair, my central focus is that of **outreach** to our communities, to raise *visibility* and *awareness* of our association and our activities-the objectives being to increase community interaction and support, as well as drawing participation of non-member teachers. During the last two years of COVID-19 restrictions, most of us in state and chapter leadership have focused on survival and accommodation—figuring out creative ways to accomplish at least some of our programs as best we could. As we launch into this new academic year of 2022-23, hopefully we can look forward to an even greater return to normal! That being the case, let us be resolved to share the wealth of WSMTA!

Allow me to share just a few **outreach strategies** with you. I encourage you to consider at least a few to start with—results tend to foster even more creativity and energy (and volunteers!).

**Build an Outreach Contact List** for your local association, consisting of:

- non-member teachers,
- music businesses,

- school music teachers,
- other arts associations,
- potential contacts who might benefit from being aware of our association and programs.

Consider making your Outreach Contact List a regular agenda item for business meetings. Engage your members to keep the concept of outreach on the front burner.



**Broaden public awareness of your activities.** Be intentional and creative about publicizing your events.



- Use that Outreach Contact List! Personal notice of and warm invitation to upcoming events
- Posters
- Flyers—create an announcement/invitation that students can send to their family and friends
- Newspaper or other media coverage
- Facebook and Social Media
- ALL OF THE ABOVE

**Appoint a chapter publicity chair** to focus on promotion strategies for all activities. OR, encourage program chairs to include promotion, targeted outreach and publicity in their planning.

#### Warmly invite participation from non-member

**teachers.** Allow these teachers (from your Outreach Contact List) to participate and experience WSMTA/ MTNA from the INSIDE. Let them "test drive" some of our outstanding programs and see how their own students would benefit. Don't even mention "membership" up front, but if they inquire, be prepared to answer their questions and assist them in applying through MTNA. Let them discover that membership holds potentially great value for them and their studios. Suggestion for Activity Registrations:

- Include a generic Teacher Fee that you would want non-member teachers to pay to help offset expenses that membership dues would normally support.
- On the next line item, WAIVE the Teacher Fee for members of your chapter. This allows non-member teachers to see what it would save them to join, without sounding like they are penalized with a "non-member fee." Positive marketing!
- If applicable to the event, allow the Teacher Fee to be waived for non-members IF they will volunteer to help at the event. Working alongside our colleagues and making connections with other teachers is one of our greatest assets!

At this beginning of a new academic year, this is a perfect opportunity to take a fresh look at our WSMTA activities through the lens of outreach!

## MUSIC ARTISTRY PROGRAM (MAP) Preparing for Your MAP Event

#### **Important MAP Dates**

- October 15: Teachers must renew their WSMTA membership in order to qualify for member rate.
- November 1: MAP Preliminary Report Due

Summer surely went by quickly! It feels like our June conference was just last week. In response to the financial concerns we received from the Chapters and the Visiting Artists, we are making a few changes this year:

#### New Student Registration Fee for MAP

The student registration fees for 15-, 20- and 30minute time slots have been raised according to the following table:

Time Slot	10	15	20	30
2021-2022 Rate	\$20	\$25	\$30	\$40
2022-2023 Rate	\$20	\$30	\$40	\$50

It is never our intention to make MAP unaffordable to families! **MAP Fee Grants** are available for teachers to apply on behalf of their students with financial need. Teachers simply need to file an online MAP Fee Grant application after registering their studios.

#### New Chapter Reimbursement Rate

The Chapter Reimbursement Rate has been raised from \$100 to \$125 per 8 hours of assessment. (Hours of assessment refers to the total scheduled hours minus Visiting Artists' lunch time.) Hopefully this will help the Chapters to offset the rising cost of venue rental and piano tuning. Chapters should still pay close attention to the transportation expense of the Visiting Artists: the amount exceeding the \$300 cap may become the responsibility of the Chapter.

#### **Visiting Artist Pay Rate**

The Visiting Artist pay rate has been increased from \$43 to \$44/hour.

#### **New Hotel Per Diem**

For all chapters (those that have not been adjusted after Sept 2021), the hotel per diem ("lodging cap") has been increased according to the table below. In essence, chapters are automatically bumped up one tier, except Seattle is bumped to a new tier of \$180.

Previous Cap	\$110	\$125	\$140	\$160
New Cap	\$125	\$140	\$160	\$180

You will find these details in the 2022-2023 MAP Chair Procedures and Visiting Artist Instructions.



#### **High School Credit**

If you would like your students to receive high school credit in Applied Music for studying with you, you need to have them take the completed High School Credit packet to their school officials for preapproval at the beginning of the school year. To be eligible, teachers must have a current NCTM or WSCTM certification, and students must participate in MAP and perform two pieces from memory. High School Credit packets will be emailed to Chapter MAP Chairs and to teachers who previously participated in the High School Credit program. If your student does not take the packet to the school for approval at the beginning of the school year, most likely the school administrator will not know what to do when the student presents the packet at the end of the school year.



The following school districts are known to approve high school credit:

- Ellensburg (0.25 credit per semester, pass/ fail only)
- Kettle Falls
- Colville
- WAVA K12 (Washington Virtual Academies)
- Homeschooled students

## COMMISSIONED COMPOSER OF THE YEAR **Preparing for Your MAP Event**

#### **Mission Statement**

The WSMTA Commissioned Composer of the Year is the Washington State segment of the MTNA Composer Commissioning Program. MTNA is dedicated to encouraging the creation of new works by American composers, and annually assists its affiliated State Associations with the generation and performance of new music through the national Composer Commissioning program. A newly commissioned work receives its premiere performance at the convention of the State MTA, which is then submitted to a panel of recognized composers for selection of the MTNA Distinguished Composer of the Year.

#### 2022 Commissioned Composer of the Year

The WSMTA 2022 Commissioned Composer of the Year, Shlomo Farber, presented his commissioned work, Nocturne for Cello and Piano at the WSMTA Conference in June, 2022; beautifully performed by Jenny Peterson, piano, and David Eby, cello. The Nocturne will now move to the MTNA selection committee, vying for the MTNA Distinguished Composer of the Year.

Shlomo's description of the piece: "The past years have been giving humanity a large dose of

adversity. As music is a form of therapy, this piece encapsulates a combination of an existential struggle along with the yearning for a resolution and a hope for a brighter future. The harmonic language is largely influenced by jazz and film music and the structure combines various elements of traditional forms such as sonata and rondo. The piece is entitled "Nocturne" as it features a melodic line with repetitive accompanying textures. However, it brings a new interpretation to the genre. In this context, the nocturne is featuring some of the darkness that the night brings along with a few glimpses of light."





#### 2023 Commissioned Composer of the Year



WSMTA is also pleased to announce the 2023 Commissioned Composer of the Year, **Sean Osborn**. Winner of prizes from the International Clarinet Association, the IBLA Grand Prize, ASCAP, and his work with the

Metropolitan Opera Orchestra, among his commissions are the North Corner Chamber Orchestra, Cornish College of the Arts, the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra Woodwind Quintet. His compositions have been performed by London Philharmonic Orchestra, Auburn Symphony, Philharmonia Northwest, American Saxophone Quartet, the orchestras of New York, Los Angeles, Boston, Seattle, the MET, and Marlboro Music Festival, with recordings by Cambria and Albany records. Combining multiple styles and genres (Modern, Celtic, Gregorian, Rock, Folk, Post-Minimal), his music is a complex overlapping rhythm and ostinati often combined with multiple simultaneous tempos and free melodies. "Extended techniques" contribute to his wide and colorful palette.
