



Japanese Concert Pianist



9 to 91: Her Musical Journey from War-torn Japan to the Pacific Northwest

At the dawn of World War II, in Tokyo Japan, Michi made her orchestral debut at age 9. During the American Occupation, she performed many times for General MacArthur who requested Gershwin's *Rhapsody in Blue* dozens of times. A decade later, still a teenager, and without speaking a word of English, Michi traveled to the United States aboard the *S.S. President Cleveland*. This new life in America included a full scholarship to Juilliard and extended stays in the Midwest, Alaska and later Washington State. Her personal and professional career included decades of touring, performing and teaching; all while raising 5 sons with her husband. Now, at age 91, Michi wants to share her final piano concert in the place she has called home for almost 50 years.

BANQUET AT THE WINTHROP BARN AUDITORIUM


The Conference Committee has worked long and hard to find the most affordable banquet for registrants.

2023 CONFERENCE GUEST ARTISTS: WEI-HAN WU AND ZACH SHEETS

Our guest artist, **Dr. Wei-Han Wu**, is a member of Pi Kappa Lambda and the recipient of the Distinguished Achievement Award from the Juilliard School, the Felicia Montealegre Fellowship from the Tanglewood Music Center, and the Collaborative Piano Fellowship from Bard College. He holds degrees from Northwestern, University of Michigan, and the Eastman School of Music, where he earned a double doctorate in piano performance and collaborative piano.

Dedicated to the performance and promotion of new music, Wei-Han is currently pianist for the [Switch~ Ensemble] as well as *Duo Axis*, which was co-founded with flutist Zach Sheets. *Duo Axis* has commissioned and premiered dozens of new works by many up-and-coming composers, including Katie Balch, Anthony Cheung, Tonia Ko, and many others. We are very fortunate that Zach will be collaborating with Wei-Han in performance.

Zach Sheets enjoys a multi-faceted career as a chamber musician, orchestral flutist, composer/performer, and advocate for funding in the arts and music education.



Zach has appeared as guest Principal Flute with the Boston Ballet and Spoleto Festival USA; the Portland, Albany and Cape Symphonies; and the Phoenix, Unitas, and Cape Cod Chamber Orchestras; and as a guest of the Boston Pops, Boston Pops Esplanade Orchestra, Rhode Island Philharmonic, Oklahoma City Philharmonic, Chorus Pro Musica, and New World Symphony. At age 23, Zach was named Principal Flute, Lyndon Paul Lorusso Chair, of the Cape Symphony Orchestra, and held that role for 9 seasons. He is a founding member of the [Switch~ Ensemble] and flute & piano *Duo Axis*.

CONFERENCE PRESENTER SPOTLIGHT



John Pickett: The Goldberg Variations

Upon retiring after 33 years of service as Professor of Piano at CWU, John Pickett decided the time had come to master the Goldberg Variations by J.S. Bach. In his session, he will give an introduction to the Variations and share some of the complexities of learning such a monumental work, followed by its performance.



Elizabeth Morris: Teaching Pop & Jazz: Decoding the Mystery

Back by popular demand, Elizabeth Morris' session last year was so well attended that she has offered to expand her presentation by including a beginning and advanced talk, which promise to resolve some of the most common mysteries regarding the teaching of popular and jazz styles. While she loves classical music and manages a very rigorous classical OMTA Syllabus program, her real love is playing and teaching popular styles, gospel, R&B, and jazz, and she loves being able to inspire musicians of all ages.



Melissa Schiel: Physiologically Informed Vocal Pedagogy

Mezzo-soprano Melissa Schiel has been on faculty at Central Washington University since 2011 and has established herself in the Pacific Northwest as a concert soloist, stage performer and recitalist. In her presentation, she will discuss the main anatomical parts for singing, then align developmental stages with those systems needed to produce sound in order to focus on pedagogical goals, addressing the needs of students from young to old. Voice teachers, choral directors, music educators, collaborative pianists, and coaches who work with a variety of ages will find a wealth of information as well as exercises and demonstrations.




CALL FOR MASTER CLASS APPLICATIONS

PEDAL POINTS

Hints for Hymns

Playing hymns on the organ is not easy. The directions for the organ Music Artistry Program ("MAP") directs that for repertoire selection, advanced students should play a hymn. Hymn playing is the topic about which I am asked the most questions and it is the most frequent request as a workshop topic.

Recently, an organ student of mine took part in the organ MAP. Dr. Jill Schneider, the visiting artist, gave my student some excellent tips to consider when playing hymns. I'll repeat my plug for the organ MAP— do it next year. You won't regret it!

To effectively lead a congregation in hymn singing, organists need to know what they are doing. This requires a lot of practice on the part of the organist. Here are some thoughts on playing hymns— some are tips that Jill gave to my student and some are mine.

- 1) During a worship service, hymn playing is the organist's paramount duty.
- 2) Know the purpose that hymns play.
- 3) Playing hymns on the organ is much different than playing hymns on the piano— there is no damper pedal on the organ to connect the chords, so the organist needs to connect with the fingers.

- 4) The soprano is paramount, followed closely by the bass. Make sure that the soprano line flows beautifully. If it is not possible to eliminate some choppiness in fingering, then plan fingerings so that the choppiness is in the alto or tenor.
- 5) Prepare fingering and pedaling with attention to detail. Mark your fingering and pedaling.
- 6) Once you can play the bass part in the pedal, it is much easier to play a hymn by playing the soprano, alto, and tenor in the hands and the bass part with the feet than by playing all four parts in the hands.
- 7) Read the text—the text drives choices in registration, tempo, and breathing. There may be differences in how you treat the different verses (also called stanzas) based upon the text.
- 8) Cue breathing for singers by lifting the hands to shorten the note before the breath—the silence will encourage the congregation to breathe.
- 9) Lifting the hands a little before a repeated word or before an important word will give a word emphasis.
- 10) Economy of motion is important. Only move the fingers and wrists as needed (this is different from piano playing).
- 11) Manual changes may look easy, but they're not. Practice them.
- 12) Registration changes require practice.



- 13) Lengthen the last chord and lift the hands to indicate a good breath before starting the next verse. The amount of time to lengthen the last chord varies with each hymn. But, the lengthening should be long enough for the congregation to breathe and swallow but not so long that it interrupts the flow of the hymn.
- 14) Have a good release of the last chord by pressing into the keys and then releasing all of the voices together. The very last chord is held longer than the other verses.
- 15) Make a hymn wish list and start learning hymns from your list. As more hymns are learned, fewer markings will be needed and it will get easier. Jill used the example that once the first twenty hymns are well-prepared, the next twenty will be easier. After the next twenty, the following twenty will be even easier.

In my teaching, it is not unusual for students to come to their lessons and complain that they can't play a hymn (it's too hard!). Yet when asked how much actual time was spent practicing a hymn, I learned that preparation was haphazard and practice time was minimal. Minimal preparation yields minimal results.

Hymn playing on the organ requires skills that can only be gained by taking the time to practice hymns as carefully as repertoire. However, the reward of careful preparation is well-worth the effort. Confidently leading a congregation that is singing with gusto is one of the most rewarding musical experiences an organist can have.

We look forward to hearing all the 1st place winners at the WSMTA State Conference YCP Recital scheduled for June 28, 2023 at 3:30 pm in Winthrop. Hope to see you all there!

MUSIC LITERACY PROGRAM

Preparing for the Music Literacy Program

Spring is a time of renewal and refreshing, and I am so glad it is upon us! On the other hand, for us, it is also a time of exhaustion with so many events upon us at the same time.

In Kitsap, we just wrapped up our Music Artistry Program and Performance Competitions, and now it is full steam ahead to our Music Literacy Program and end of the year events!

Although April usually begins with Spring Break, for me it usually begins with all of my last-minute preparations for our Carnival/MLP event. I'll be giving my students their theory practice tests, going over corrections with them, giving them their two practice sight reading exams (you can find your own examples for free in a different teaching curriculum than you use for lessons, or you can purchase Wendy Stevens' perfectly leveled practice exams at composecreate.com), and running them through all of their strategies for the day. Let me give you a little sneak peek into what that looks like!

Suzie Q (Mary Grant's favorite pretend student) is taking Level 4 Technique for piano, so I will have her memorize "SRICA" (Scales, Roots, Inversions, Cadences and Arpeggios), and she'll play two sets (one each of her prepared major and minor scales) for two separate weeks prior to our event. She is taking Level 5 Rhythm, so I'll have her clap two rhythms for me every 3 weeks or so (I started this back in November), and we'll talk about how she

can take her test back to her seat and quietly practice it before her test. She is taking Level 4 Theory, so she took her practice test, and we walked through what she messed up, and how to figure out key signatures etc... She is taking Level 4 Sight Reading, so we did one practice test a month ago, and the second one two weeks prior to the event. We walked through exactly how to prepare her best for the test: sit down, tap and count it, play through each hand on her lap (paying special attention to the key signature and any accidentals), then play through the whole thing on her lap. We discussed exactly how she'll be graded, with a half point off for any pauses or wrong notes, and how dynamics and touches are extra credit. She is taking Level 6 Ear Training, so we have done extensive practice on interval recognition, I've made up a few rhythmic dictation examples that she has rocked, as well as a couple of melodic dictations for her to practice.

In addition to her five main exams, Suzie will also be writing a short composer report, making a lovely cake decorated like sheet music, performing her recital piece, and playing many fun games in the gym.

Now, all of these offerings depend on your chapter. Perhaps this year your chapter is just dipping their toes into the MLP and offering theory. Fantastic! Or perhaps your chapter does the whole shebang, and you are individually dipping your toe into just the rhythm test. Fabulous! However you choose to integrate the MLP into your teaching, I am here to support you. If our goal is for every student to gain Music Literacy, then these exams are an invaluable tool in helping us reach that goal.

Call for Composers: Submissions Accepted February 1-April 15, 2023

To encourage the creation of new music by American composers, the Music Teachers National Association (MTNA) annually assists its State Associations with a Composer Commissioning Program. Each state-commissioned composition is digitally submitted to MTNA for selection of the National Distinguished Composer of the Year, which is presented

in concert and receives \$5,000. The composer retains ownership of the composition.

In conjunction with MTNA, WSMTA is seeking candidates for the 2024 Commissioned Composer of the Year (CCOY) to prepare a new composition according to the following requirements. The selected commissioned composer will receive \$2,500 when the composition is premiered at the June 2024 WSMTA State Conference.

The selected State Commissioned Composer (as well as the selected National Distinguished Composer) will be responsible for finance and logistics regarding performers, rehearsals, and performance of the selected composition at the conference, and will also provide copies for archives. To keep composer's costs to a minimum, it is suggested that the piece be for one or two performers.

The WSMTA 2024 composition requirements:

- For Advanced or Professional level for any instrument or voice
- Composer must reside in Washington State
- Membership in WSMTA or MTNA is not required
- Previously commissioned composers and current employees of WSMTA are ineligible

For further contract responsibilities, rights of a commissioned composer, and other information contact Louise Nedela.

To be considered, please submit the following by April 15, 2023 to Louise Nedela:

- Two of your original compositions that you have in your catalog that you feel will be representative of your compositional ability for this project; format-pdf scores and mp3 recordings; (arrangements of another composer are not accepted)
- A short bio
- Contact information
- A synopsis of your intended project that adheres to the requirements

The selected composer will subsequently prepare a new composition as stated above.

Sean Osborn, 2023 Commissioned Composer of the Year

The 2023 Commissioned Composer of the Year is Sean Osborn. Sean's commissioned work will be performed at the WSMTA Conference in June.

"I am in the process of composing a Sonata for Flute and Piano. This work would be 15-20 minutes in length and have three movements. I am a firm believer in using the full color ranges of instrument's abilities, but always in service to the musical ideas not just for novelty's sake. "Extended techniques" like prepared piano, flutter tongue, multi-phonics, harmonics, and other sounds would be employed in this composition to enhance the musical expression and emotional impact."

Sean Osborn's Biography:

Composer and Clarinetist Sean Osborn has traveled the world as soloist, chamber musician, and during his eleven years with the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra. Winner of prizes from the International Clarinet Association, the IBLA Grand Prize, ASCAP, and others, Sean has been commissioned by the North Corner Chamber Orchestra, Cornish College of the Arts, the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra Woodwind Quintet, and multiple solo performers. His compositions have been widely performed by amateurs, students, and professionals, including the London Philharmonic Orchestra, Auburn Symphony, Philharmonia Northwest, and members of the American Saxophone Quartet, the orchestras of New York, Los Angeles, Boston, Seattle, the MET and participants in the Marlboro Music Festival. Mr. Osborn's compositions have also been featured on recordings by Cambria and Albany records, and reviewers have called his music full of "ingenious antiphony and counterpoint" (ClassicalNet), "unusual and consistently engaging." (City Arts), "fun-to-play" (The Clarinet), "engaging" (Fanfare), and "impetuous" (Höffner Volksblatt).

Combining multiple styles and genres (Modern, Celtic, Gregorian, Rock, Folk, Post-Minimal, etc.), Mr. Osborn achieves a synthesis like no other. Complex overlapping rhythm and ostinati often combine with multiple simultaneous tempos and free melodies. "Extended techniques" make up his wide and colorful palette, with each unusual sound always in service to the musical expression.
